EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Dr. M. Abdul Haq founded Osmania College in Kurnool in 1947 to serve the people of backward Rayalaseema who could not otherwise afford to go to distant places for higher studies. He used his official contacts to get the college affiliated to Madras University. The college was named after His Exalted Highness the Nizam of Hyderabad who made a generous donation of two lakh rupees in 1946. Through the joint efforts of Anjuman-e-Islamiah and Dr. M. Abdul Haq (Founder), the college was established in 1947, which is paying rich dividends to all sections of society and to say the least every house in Kurnool has a graduate from the College.

The institution has been established as a Linguistic and Muslim Minority Institution under Article 30 of the Constitution of India to cater to the educational needs of the Minority Community. The College is recognized under 2(f) and 12(B) of the UGC Act of 1956 and is now affiliated to Rayalaseema University, Kurnool. The college has been enjoying a good reputation for the past six decades. It was permitted by the Government of Andhra Pradesh in Memo.No.57213/CE-1/85-3 Education dated 21-8-1986 to start full fledged parallel sections for women. Parallel sections for women were established during 1986-1987 in response to the local demand. The Management has provided a separate campus and buildings for women's education keeping in view the safety and privacy of girl students.

The history of the college remains incomplete without a reference to the invaluable services rendered by Dr. M. Abdul Haq (Founder) and his son, Mr. M. Mahfuzul Haq. Dr. M. Abdul Haq was an educationist par excellence who went on holding high positions in the realms of higher education. Besides being the Principal of Government Mohammadan College, Madras and the Principal of Presidency College, Madras, he held the office of Pro-Vice-Chancellor, Aligarh Muslim University in 1952. He died in harness as Chairman, Madras Public Service Commission, Madras in March, 1958. He was associated with the establishment of Farooq College in Feroke, Malabar, Jamal Mohammad College in Tiruchirapalli, New College and South Indian Education Trust's Women's College in Madras. The Urdu University established in Kurnool by the Government of Andhra Pradesh is named as Dr. M. Abdul Haq Urdu University as a token of our founder's yeoman services to the field of education.

Mr. Mahfuzul Haq was the Secretary and Correspondent of the Osmania College Managing Committee for a long time. His period witnessed setting up of laboratories and improvisation of infrastructural facilities. During his time there was unprecedented development and expansion. He established the following institutions:

1. Parallel Degree sections for Women
2. Osmania Junior College for Girls
3. Osmania Law College
4. Osmania College of Education.

He was instrumental in starting several vocational courses in the College.

Mrs. Azra Javed is the present Secretary and Correspondent of the Managing Committee. She is the granddaughter of Dr. M. Abdul Haq (Founder) and the daughter of Mr. M. Mahfuzul Haq. She assumed charge as Secretary and Correspondent on 26-11-2000 and since then she has been evincing great interest in the expansion and development of the institution. The following courses are added during her period:

The College has been enjoying the Autonomous Status since 2005. The College was accredited with 'A' Grade by NAAC. Re – accreditation (Accreditation, cycle 2) is under process. The college was selected as 'Centre of Excellence for Best Practices' in 2014 by the CCE, Hyderabad. It was also awarded 'A' grade by the CCE, based on KPI, in a state-wide evaluation of the colleges.

The Salient features of the Criterion-wise analysis are given below:

CRITERION-I:

The college, established on 2nd July 1947, a month before Indian Independence, is one of the premier institutions in Andhra Pradesh. The College was conferred with Autonomy from 2005-2006. It has been following Semester System since the conferment of Autonomy. It was accredited with 'A' grade by NAAC in 2007. It was recognized as Centre of Excellence for Best Practices in 2014 by the Commissioner of Collegiate Education (CCE), Government of Andhra Pradesh, Hyderabad. The vision of our Founder was to transform Osmania College into a Deemed University.

It offers 19 UG courses, 6 PG courses, 8 Certificate courses. The value added courses offered are Environmental Studies, Citizenship Education, Human Values and Professional Ethics.

The college has introduced training in employability skills, which is given to the students through Jawahar Knowledge Centre (JKC), National Council for Promotion of Urdu Language (NCPUL) and Regional Centre for Educational Development of Minorities (RCEDM).

Opportunities for employment are provided with the help of Placement Cell and Career & Guidance Cell, which enable them to participate in on-campus/off-campus recruitment drives.

The mechanism of designing and development of the curriculum is based on Board of Studies (BOS), which consists of Chairman, Members of the respective departments, External Members, University Nominee, one Meritorious Alumnus, and Nominee from Industry /Allied Sector.

The feedback obtained from all the stakeholders is analyzed and suggestions are incorporated for the improvement of the academic and administrative activities.

The college conducts National and International Seminars. It also invites experts from various areas to address the students which will be helpful to them in research. Their opinions and suggestions are taken into account for curriculum design and benefit of the college.

The college has introduced Semester System under Autonomy for UG courses, grooming the students in tune with the National and International trends through foundation courses. PG entrance coaching is given to final year degree students to get admission into reputed universities and higher

learning centers. Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) is introduced from the academic year 2015-2016 to give flexibility to students.

Because of the autonomous status the curriculum of the college and syllabuses of all the subjects are discussed in detail in the BOS meetings and the college has incorporated appropriate knowledge and skills keeping in view the local needs, global competencies, employability and social relevance within the possibility of 20% change in the APSCHE/University common core syllabus.

Every year the Institution undergoes the process of self-assessment and takes steps to maintain quality education. This exercise enables both quality and sustained improvement in the overall performance of the students. Feedback obtained from the alumni in the BOS meetings also help in designing of the curriculum. IQAC identifies vulnerable areas of learning and proposes interventional remedies. The Institution nurtures the linkage between itself and the stakeholders, which has resulted in the free flow of ideas and views.

CRITERION-II:

The college is located in the heart of the city catering to the needs of higher learning with the onerous objective of making undergraduate and post-graduate education available at an affordable fee to the rural and under-privileged sections in general and to women students in particular.

The Management of the college embarked upon a systematic planned construction of buildings and creation of other facilities like classrooms, e-classrooms, seminar halls, laboratories, ICT centre, Computer Centre, MANA TV, etc. The college library has extensive collection of books with accessibility to scholarly content through N-List.

The admission process in the college is transparent. Most of the students admitted are first generation rural learners from downtrodden strata of society. It is the endeavour of the Institution not only to uplift and empower them, but also to make them fit for employment in the job market. The college offers 19 UG programmes, 6 PG programmes, and 8 Certificate courses. These programmes reflect the goals of the institution and the needs of the students.

The college organizes orientation programmes in the beginning of the academic year. The students are familiarized with course outlines, academic calendar, examination module, evaluation process, learning outcomes, etc.

The college has embraced the semester system with its own academic calendar, annual teaching plan and evaluation blue print. Learning is made more student-centric with participatory ICT-enabled innovative teaching methods practiced by the faculty for improved student learning and their holistic development.

The college has freedom to design its own curricula and flexibility through the BOS meetings to include additional inputs of local and contemporary relevance and value addition.

Students from the disadvantaged community have shown positive academic growth. Slow learners are identified and remedial coaching is arranged. Advanced learners are identified and they have been encouraged for preparing Students' Study Projects.

The grievances of the physically / visually challenged students are addressed effectively. Mentor-ward mechanism is in practice. Learning outcomes are also analyzed by marks obtained in the IAE and SEE examinations and classroom interactions.

The learning outcomes such as employability, leadership quality, environmental awareness, social responsibility etc are incorporated through the BOS meetings.

Quality teaching is ensured by the college in all the departments with the help of qualified and dedicated teachers. The institution continuously monitors and evaluates the quality of teaching - its methods, classroom environment and the learning resources for the benefit of the staff and students.

All teachers prepare teaching plan for proper execution. The college has 22 faculty members with Ph.D. degree and 36 with M.Phil. Degrees. 11 faculty members have qualified themselves for UGC-NET/SET/SLET. The faculty members have published 80 papers in National and 58 papers in International Journals. They have participated and presented 379 research papers at seminars conducted by various organizations, at National and International level.

10 meritorious students were honoured with Pratibha Awards by the Chief Minister of Andhra Pradesh. They received a cash award of Rs. 20000-00, a certificate and a DELL Tablet.

The dates of commencement of IAE and SEE examination schedules are printed in the academic calendar and distributed to the students in the beginning of the academic year. This helps the students to plan and prepare

for the tests effectively. The IAE components include tests, assignments, and attendance at the UG level.

The student-evaluation is done through Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) with 25% weightage and Semester End External Evaluation with 75% weightage, employing transparent procedures to monitor the academic progress relentlessly.

Evaluation reforms are introduced from time to time. The college maintains sustained, good results in the Semester End Examinations. The pass percentage of the students is consistent.

The college policy is to invite eminent faculty as resource persons to deliver guest lectures. The college organizes National and International Seminars/Workshops, and adopts technology enabled teaching and learning processes, for academic enrichment of students. Industrial visits, field trips, project work, on-job training, Earn while you Learn, internship, exposure to practical field work, conduct of bridge course to the disadvantaged students at the entry level, help in creating a holistic, student-centric environment on the campus.

The Principal and the teaching staff are given full freedom regarding academic work and functioning. Adverse impact of the policy of the government of not filling up the vacancies caused by the retirement and demise of the staff is minimized by the timely recruitment of the faculty by the Management.

CRITERION-III:

The college with its commendable research potential is known for its dedicated efforts towards achieving excellence in teaching and research. The college has a Research Committee to encourage and support the teaching staff in applying for research projects, presenting research papers in National and International Seminars, Conferences and Workshops. It also encourages interdisciplinary research. Staff members are motivated to pursue research under UGC sponsored Faculty Development Programme (FDP). Research activities are noteworthy in the most of the departments. The members of the staff are granted duty leave for participation and paper presentation in Seminars and Conferences.

The staff and students are allowed to make use of the departmental and central libraries, laboratory facility and Internet for their research work. The college has 22 doctorates for offering research guidance in their respective fields. The college invites eminent researchers to participate in National and International Seminars. The college has organized 06 National Seminars and 01 International Seminar.

The college has received an amount of Rs. 43, 77,500/- towards financial assistance from UGC. 26 Minor Research Projects and 01 Major Research Project have been sanctioned. 18 Minor Research Projects are completed.

Two of the faculty members participated in International Seminar at Colombo, Sri Lanka. Two faculty members participated in COP-II International Biodiversity Conference, at Kondapur, Hyderabad.

The members of the faculty have presented 379 papers in National Seminars and 68 in International Seminars. 168 research papers are published in National Journals and 58 in International Journals. 09 books and 31 chapters in books are published. 04 members of the staff have acted as Resource Persons for National Seminars/Conferences/Workshops. 10 of our staff members have published research papers in interdisciplinary mode. The Management honours the faculty who acquire Ph.D. Degrees and the staff for their outstanding contribution in research work. 02 of our faculty members undertook Summer Fellowship Programmes.

The Department of Botany has an MOU with Central Unani Research Institute, Hyderabad. The Department of Chemistry has an MOU with the Department of Medicine, Harvard Medical School, Boston, for providing pure organic extracts to study anti-diabetic and anti-inflammatory properties. All the departments have MOU with the Office of District Educational Officer (DEO), Secondary School Education, Kurnool, and Regional Inspection Officer (RIO), Board of Intermediate Education, Kurnool, for providing pro bono consultancy in their respective domain. The Department of Botany has provided consultancy to Dr. M. Abdul Haq Unani Medical College, Kurnool, for supply of plant products. The Department of Commerce has been providing consultancy in the filing of preliminary report of Income Tax returns of the members of the staff. The Department of Chemistry offers consultancy services for identifying minerals from rock material. A sum of Rs. 5000/- generated through consultancy is utilized for student study projects.

The Department of Telugu has a linkage with Mahatma Gandhi Institute, Mauritius. The Department of Zoology has linkage with Dairy and Department of Fisheries. The Department of Chemistry has linkage with Rayalaseema Alkalies and the Department of Botany with the Forest Department, Botanical Survey of India, Hyderabad, and Central Unani Research Centre, Hyderabad.

The college has IGNOU Study Centre, Jawahar Knowledge Centre (JKC) and Regional Centre for Educational Development of Minorities (RCEDM).

The NCC Company (01) with 200 cadets of the college is actively involved in nation building activities, social outreach programmes besides promoting communal harmony and sensitizing people to health and environmental issues. The participation of the NCC cadets in Swachh Bharath Abhiyan, Swachh Bharath –Swachh Kurnool, Sadbhavana rallies, Ekta Divas, awareness programmes etc. has a positive impact on the people of Kurnool city. As a part of Community outreach programme, NCC cadets often visit orphanages, Old age homes, Blind Students' Hostels and distribute the essential commodities, blankets, etc. The involvement of NCC cadets in Save Hundri Programme, a campaign for saving the river Hundri in Kurnool city, has won appreciation from the District and State Officials. The contribution of NCC in fund raising during various natural calamities is praiseworthy.

NCC cadets participated in National camps like Trekking, NIC, Army Attachment, Advanced leadership, All India Shooting Championship, Thal Sainik etc. NCC Officer and cadets have won many Awards / Medals / Commendation Certificates for their outstanding contribution in nation building activities.

NSS units (04) of the college, comprising 400 volunteers, aim at developing one's personality through community service. Apart from the regular activities, NSS units are actively involved in Green Drive, Mega Blood Donation camps, awareness programmes on health, environment, social and cultural issues. NSS Programme Officers and volunteers received many awards and commendation certificates from Indian Red Cross Society, District/Local administration as well as from various organizations and foundations for their outstanding contribution to the field of social service. NSS units of the college have adopted two villages namely Stantanpuram and Venkayapalli for Community developmental activities.

CRITERION-IV:

The college is one of the most preferred colleges in the Rayalaseema region of Andhra Pradesh. To maintain privacy and modesty of the girl students, the parallel sections for women, are located on a separate campus.

The college is fully developed and has a campus of 9.5 acres for Men's wing and 3.5 acres for Women's wing with built-up area of 12,542.93 sqmt and 14,932 sqmt respectively. Staff rooms are provided for all the departments.

NCC consisting of 200 cadets and NSS with 400 volunteers participate in nation building and social service activities besides the general students and the staff.

The college has adequate infrastructure to run the educational programmes. The college has the state-of-the art laboratories, well ventilated classrooms, e-classrooms, mineral water plant unit, ramp/lift facility, adequate number of toilets, two-wheeler and four-wheeler parking space, ladies waiting room, cafeteria, Central Bank of India and a Post Office.

There are separate office rooms for UG and PG. Examination Branch with all facilities is available. Well grown trees, a lush green lawn in the quadrangle, a botanical garden with number of medicinal plants promote greenery on the campus. Well protected compound, internal RCC roads and flood lights mark the campus.

Multistation gym is available in the campus. There is a separate playground and Physical Director for Women students. All the required facilities for indoor games are available. To promote interest in cultural events, the Fine-Arts and Literary Association, plays a major role in identifying the inherent artistic talents of students. 04 spacious auditoriums are provided on the college premises

The library was formally declared open by Dr. ZAKIR HUSSAIN Saheb, Former President of India, who was also the Vice Chancellor, Aligarh Muslim University, Aligarh, on 20th June 1954. The library building in Men's wing consists of quite a big hall with old grandeur, accommodating about 250 students at a time, for reference and consultation for staff and students.

The library has 44,159 books and 37 Journals. Internet access to e-Journals through N-List, INFLIBNET is available in the Library. Separate UG and PG sections, MRP and Research section and reprographic facility are available in the Library. Besides General Library, most of the Departments have separate Libraries.

The ICT-enabled classrooms / learning spaces, Smart Boards, LCD and DVD, AV-Aids, Language Laboratory and MANA TV room are available and utilized for enhancing the quality of teaching and learning. Un-interrupted power supply is ensured by the generators.

The college management takes care of the maintenance of all the infrastructural facilities and enriches all the vital learning resources for the benefit of the faculty and students. The campus is clean and green true to the spirit of Swachh Bharath.

CRITERION-V:

The student mentoring and support activities occupy a very important place in the college. It aims at the multi-facial development of the students. The college provides various schemes for the overall development of the students through career counseling, provision of soft skills, and publication of prospectus and financial assistance like scholarships and free-ships. The college provides support services to physically challenged and the economically backward section of the students. The students get support services through participation in various competitions and conferences and health facilities like medical camps and health check-up programmes. Students get support services through special programmes for the enhancement of their study skills by remedial coaching classes.

The college has sound policies for the enhancement of students' participation in Sports and Games and Extra-curricular activities. It has a separate mechanism for the placement of students by Placement Cell, and the students are selected during on-campus and off-campus recruitment drives by various multi-national companies. The Alumni Association has made a generous contribution to the development of the institution and the student community. The college has a student grievance cell for redressing the grievances of the students.

The college gets cooperation from the stakeholders to ensure the overall development of the students in curricular and extra-curricular activities, research and community orientation. It has elicited cooperation from all the stakeholders at various levels to achieve the goals and objectives of the institution towards the overall development of the students. It has also adopted various schemes to motivate the participation of students in sports and cultural events. The students have participated successfully in various National and International sports and Games competitions and bagged Gold, Bronze, and Silver medals bringing laurels to the institution.

The college has ensured the participation of Women students from the Women's wing of the college in various National and International Sports activities and bagged medals. Similarly, the college has ensured the participation of women students in various cultural activities at state level cultural programmes and received prizes.

The programme-wise success rate of the college for past four years is high at both UG and PG levels. The students' progression for UG to PG and PG to research and employment is also good. The programme-wise completion rate of the students is high, while the drop-out rate is insignificant and low. The percentage of students who appeared for various examinations and succeeded is also high.

CRITERION-VI:

The governance and leadership provided by the college management is exemplary. All the decisions of the College, like annual budget requirements, teaching staff recruitment, non-teaching staff recruitment, infrastructure development, and student support and welfare schemes are taken by the Management committee.

The vision and mission of the college are well translated into the activities at the College and form the foundation for the development of the quality policy. Every academic endeavor strives to fulfil the quality policy of the college. Students from various backgrounds and walks of life are welcomed and made a part of various activities that churn out the true potential in them. The stint at the college for every student is a rediscovery of oneself. This is vividly elucidated in the myriad activities conducted by the college. This gives multi-quotient development in the students.

The Principal is the administrative Head of the College. A senior faculty of the College acts as Vice Principal and assists the Principal. The Principal, Staff Council, Academic council, BOS, IQAC with various other sub-committees of the college coordinate various activities of the college, especially academic activities. The Principal in coordination with NSS & NCC Officers of the college monitors the different awareness and outreach programmes with a sense of social responsibility.

The Commissionerate of Collegiate Education (CCE), Government of Andhra Pradesh, Hyderabad, carries out the academic audit once a year by its Academic advisors. IQAC plays an important role during the academic audit. The CCE has taken up the academic audit from 2013-14 onwards. The CCE appoints Academic advisors trained by it. On the basis of the recommendations made by the Academic Advisors, the Principal suggests corrective measures to the Departments concerned. From 2014-15, the CCE introduced grading system in academic audit. The college was given 'A' grade during 2014-15 in external audit by CCE Academic advisors. Based on the recommendations of the academic audit, the Principal suggests the specific measures to be implemented by the members of the Staff for the improvement of teaching, learning and evaluation.

The Institution is driven by progressive change by identifying organizational needs and championing organizational development. The Organizational development is carried out by feedback from stakeholders (students, parents, staff and alumni), Promotion of Research activities, encouragement and support to organize seminars, workshops etc. The faculty members are also encouraged to participate in various events like seminars, refresher courses, orientation courses, workshops (National & International) etc. which take place on the campus and off the campus. The Department of

Telugu conducted an International seminar. The Departments of Physics, Chemistry, English, Urdu, Political Science and History, Economics and Commerce conducted National seminars sponsored by UGC. Faculty members published papers in different International and National Conferences/Seminars, etc.

The Governing body and the Academic Council of the College, discuss the plans and policies, goals and objectives of the College. IQAC and Academic Council ensure quality and review effectiveness of various programmes and activities. The Principal is at the helm of the affairs and plays a leading role in governance and management of the College. The Incharge of the Departments and committees headed by the faculty members execute the plans and policies. Every activity on campus is planned with a check list and a multi-level supervision. Students are given sufficient freedom to innovate, execute and learn from their experiences.

The Chemistry laboratory which was damaged by the floods of 2009 was completely refurbished by an alumnus of the Institution working in HOLCIM Trading Company, DUBAI. It was a Herculean task which was solved by the management committee.

The preparation of the Institutional annual budget involves the Finance Committee, Purchase committee, IQAC and the respective departments. UGC provides substantial financial assistance for the growth and development of the Institution. The received UGC grants are properly utilized as directed by the UGC.

All financial accounts of the college, the research funds sanctioned for Minor/Major research projects by various state/national agencies and all UGC funds sanctioned for the development of the College are audited by an internal auditor and then by the external auditors of the CCE, Hyderabad.

CRITERION-VII:

Innovations and best practices in the college are designed in a very practical way which help the students to pursue their academics as well as to excel in curricular and co-curricular activities with zeal and enthusiasm. The teacher friendly management, student friendly faculty members and eco-friendly environment make our college a most sought after institution. The college conducts green audit with a sense of commitment and dedication.

The College has taken many initiatives to make the campus eco-friendly. A committee is constituted in order to keep the campus clean and green. Rain water harvesting pits, tree plantation in the garden and herbarium provide a beautiful atmosphere. NSS programme officers and volunteers organize many awareness programmes on 'Save Hundri' Global warming,

HIV/AIDS, Voters day, Consumer Day etc., Waste Chemicals from laboratories are carefully disposed of by specialized drainages. The condemned computers, accessories and other peripherals are sent to vendors by way of E-Waste Management and as a mark of best practice.

The co-curricular activities of the college have brought a lot of name and fame to the institution since its inception.

The skill-based courses and innovative programmes are introduced to meet the current trends of the society. About 100 units of blood are donated by our students every year. The NSS volunteers and the NCC cadets of the college have rendered excellent services and their services are recognized at both District and State levels.

The unique Save Hundri River Campaign (SHRC) has created awareness of environmental issues among the people of Kurnool. The college has adopted two villages, Venkayapally and Stantanpuram for community developmental activities. The Alumni have generously established a multi-station GYM and have refurbished the Chemistry lab. The construction of the Tahera Rasheed Auditorium by the Alumni is also noteworthy. The Alumni also render financial assistance to the poor students through the institution of several endowment scholarships. The women students are counselled and encouraged to face the challenges of life and emerge successfully in professional as well as personal life.

Economically weak students are given an opportunity to serve under “Earn while you Learn” scheme every year. Rain water harvesting points are set up on the campus. “Energy Savings Campaign” aims at creating awareness among students of the use of electricity and fuel with a motto “Save Fuel for Better Tomorrow”. Innovations made in the academic and related activities speak of the rapid progress of the college. Prayers are recited from the Quran, the Geeta and the Bible before the commencement of any function. The Department of Botany has a digital library. There is a Wifi Internet facility in the library.

The resources mobilized from various sources are effectively used to enhance the quality of teaching learning process, strengthen the infrastructure and enrich the welfare activities for both the faculty members and students.

The college strives in all the possible ways for the betterment and enlightenment of economically and socially disadvantaged sections of the society in tune with the vision and mission of the college. The college sincerely wishes and hopes to succeed in abundance in the years to come and continue to spread light of knowledge as it believes in “LEAD KINDLY LIGHT”.

1.1.1 How are the institutional vision / mission reflected in the academic programmes of the College?


The vision as well as mission of the college is communicated to the students through college prospectus, handbook, college magazine, and during the Induction programme / Freshers' Day.


2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

Transparency in Admission:

The college ensures transparency in the admission procedure through the following:

- Admissions are open to all irrespective of religion, caste, and creed. Based on the marks obtained in the qualifying examinations candidates are selected.
- Spot admissions for self -financing courses are based on merit.
- The Institution publishes the prospectus, which has all the necessary information regarding the college admission procedure including course-wise fee structure. This is issued along with the application form to the candidates before their admission.
- The college collects the course fee as mentioned in the prospectus. It does not collect donations.

Once a candidate applies for admission into UG programme, his/her application is thoroughly scrutinized by the Admission Committee. Spot admissions are made for UG self-financing programmes of study.

For PG programmes, the candidates are selected based on their rank at RUPGCET. Allotment to this College is made through counselling based on the option exercised by the candidates.

Ph.D. programmes are not offered by the college.

- 2.1.3 Does the College have a mechanism to review its admission process and student profiles annually? If yes, what is the outcome of such an analysis and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

Yes. The college reviews its admission process in regular admission committee meetings with due inputs to all members about analysis of student profiles and possibilities of process improvement. A review is made on the socio-economic profile of the student. The needs of differently disabled students are addressed and fee concessions are extended to the eligible candidates.

Scholarships and fee concessions have been introduced with transparent admission procedure to attract better quality students. Direct admission with fee concession is given to the students with outstanding performance in Sports and Games, NCC and NSS.







2.2.2 Does the College have a mechanism through which the “differential requirements of student population” are analyzed after admission and before the commencement of classes? If so, how are the key issues identified and addressed?

Yes, differential requirements of the heterogeneous student community are worked out after the admission process and before the commencement of the first year curricular activities as explained below:

i) Identification Mechanism:

Analysis of the academic, socio-economic profile of the students is done by the Mentor concerned. Assessment of the knowledge, skills and needs of the students is done by the faculty concerned.



ii) Identification of key issues and their solutions:

Improvement of communication skills in English:

- Most of the students are from rural background and disadvantaged communities with poor communication skills
- Improvement of communication skills through JKC training programme/English Language Lab.

Medium problem:

- Majority of the students who did their Intermediate education in Telugu and Urdu Medium feel difficult to cope with English medium
- Counselling and guidance to the students to cope with English medium.

Support for differently abled Students:

- A few students under differently abled category get admitted every year for whom special support services are provided.
- Tri-cycles are provided for physically disabled students.
- Braille manuscripts are available in the library for the visually challenged students.
- Scribes are provided for visually/physically challenged students during examinations.
- Extra-time allotted during examinations.
- Classes on the Ground Floor.
- Ramp facility
- Lift facility
- Disbursement of Incentives

2.2.3 Does the College provide bridge /Remedial /add - on courses? If yes, how are they structured into the time table? Give details of the courses offered, department-wise/faculty-wise?

Yes. The college provides bridge/remedial and add-on courses.

Bridge Course

- Bridge courses in all subjects are conducted for the entrants during the first week in the beginning of every academic year (within the college hours)
- Bridge courses are also conducted for students from vocational courses and students of open school system by the subject teachers concerned.

Remedial Classes:

- Slow learners are identified by evaluating their performance in Internal and Semester End examinations and classes are arranged for them outside the college hours.

- Add – on/ Certificate Courses are provided under the UGC approved career oriented programme by the Institution. The classes for these courses are conducted outside the college hours and on holidays to enable the students to add value and to improve their job prospects. A study on the incremental academic growth of different categories of students has been carried out on students from disadvantaged sections of society and physically challenged students of the last batch i.e. 2012-15. The difference of performance in terms of number of 1st classes between entry and exit levels is taken as a measuring parameter.

The data of the different categories of students in the college has been collected from the proctors concerned. The data listed below is analyzed to initiate measures for improvement in performance.



Evaluation Blueprint:

The performance of the students is evaluated through

- (a) Theory Evaluation
 - Internal assessment
 - Semester End Examination
- (b) Evaluation in practicals
- (c) Transparency in evaluation process
- (d) Declaration of results

(a) Theory evaluation:

The College follows a system of evaluation based on continuous internal assessment and external assessment at the end of each semester in an organized method. Each theory paper is for 100 marks in each semester and is distributed with 25:75 weightage, between internal evaluation and external evaluation with 35% as qualifying minimum in internal and external end examination and 40% overall passing minimum.

➤ **Internal Assessment Evaluation (IAE):**

The Internal Assessment in theory consists of two tests in each semester. Each test is held approximately after 40 days of instruction as per the dates notified by the Examination Branch. The departments concerned will provide the syllabus and the model question papers for each test. The weightage of the evaluation for each theory paper in a subject is as follows:

Internal assessment: 25 marks
Internal Assessment Examination (IAE): 20 marks
Attendance: 05 marks

➤ **Semester-End Examinations (SEE):**

- i. Semester End Examination is for 75 marks
- ii. Regular and Supplementary Semester-End Examinations (SEE) for odd semesters (I,III, V) are held in October/November and for even semesters (II, IV, VI) in March/April every year.
- iii. Question papers for Semester-End Examinations are prepared by the external paper setters according to the syllabi and the model question papers approved by the Boards of Studies and the Academic Council.

(b) **Evaluation in Practicals:**

- Each practical paper carries 50 marks
- Practical exams are conducted annually and evaluation of not only the laboratory work but also record and viva-voce is done.
- For the purpose of practical examinations, students are divided into small batches. Each batch has to take the examination as per the schedule.

(c) **Transparency in evaluation process:**

The evaluation process passes through the following stages for internal and semester end external examinations.

- Internal exams: The College involves the faculty members of respective departments in valuation of scripts with utmost transparency.
- Semester-End-External Exams: Six important stages are involved in the method of external evaluation.

Stage I	:	Coding the Answer Scripts
Stage II	:	Valuation by External/Internal Examiners
Stage III	:	Scrutiny of Answer Scripts
Stage IV	:	Decoding the Valued Answer Scripts
Stage V	:	Publication of Results
Stage VI	:	Re-totalling, Personal Identification and Revaluation, where the valuation is challenged.

(d) **Declaration of results:**

The performance of the students is measured in terms of percentage of marks. The results of Languages (Part – I) and Optional subjects (Part –II) and Foundation Courses (Part – III) are shown separately, mentioning the performance level indicators as furnished in the table below.

- Involvement of the students in field visits / project works / educational tours / extension activities etc.,

Evaluation methods:

- Continuous Internal Assessment with 25% weightage.
- Semester – End External Examination with 75% weightage.

Requirement for the award of the Degree:

The students are required to fulfill the following requirements for the award of the Degree.

- They have to put up a minimum of 75% attendance to take the exams.
- Should secure a minimum of 40% score in internal and external examination together.

Course schedule:

- The monthly schedule consists of weekly topics to be covered as per the faculty annual curricular plans.
- The effective process is ensured through continuous monitoring of the implementation of the activities as per the curricular plans and performance outcome of the students.

A) Lecture Method:

In all the courses lecture method is followed for theory classes. Besides the lecture method, the following methods are adopted.

B) Other Methods:

- ICT powered innovative teaching method is used in UG and PG courses.
- Slides, maps, models, charts, computer-oriented solutions are used in the classrooms, especially in the science classes.
- Teaching aids like OHPs, PPTs, Videos, LCD Projectors are used.
- Students are permitted access to Mana TV. Some of the Staff Members have acted as Resources Persons in Mana TV live telecast programmes of CCE (Commissionerate of Collegiate Education), Hyderabad.
- Students are guided to browse the websites for e-content in various subjects.

- A variety of supplementary methods like class seminars, debates, elocutions, essay writing, creative writing, group discussion, project work, quiz etc., are also used by the departments.
- Study tours, industrial visits, internship and earn while you learn scheme have enabled the students to have practical learning experience for enhancing their knowledge.
- Study material and handouts are also provided.
- Case study method.

2.3.7 Is there a provision for the services of counselors / mentors/ advisors for each class or group of students for academic, personal and psycho-socio guidance? If yes, give details of the process and the number of students who have benefitted.

Yes. The details of the process are as follows:

- Each Mentor for 20 students to provide academic, personal and psycho-social guidance. The bio-data of the students (wards) is scrutinized and the strengths and weaknesses are assessed.

- Attendance and performance in internal and external examinations of all the subjects of the students are closely monitored by the respective Mentors.
- In addition to this, behavioral pattern of the wards is monitored periodically.
- The parents are informed about the progress of their wards periodically.
- Weak students are identified and are directed to attend remedial coaching classes and suitable counseling is given to them as per their requirements such as providing study material, etc.
- The students also approach the grievance cell and the grievance cell solves the problems in due consultation with the Principal.
- Bright students are identified and are given counseling in getting jobs and pursuing higher studies.

No. of students who have been benefited are 60% to 70%.

2.3.8 Are there any innovative teaching approaches/methods/practices adopted/put to use by the faculty during the last four years? If yes, did they improve the learning? What methods were used to evaluate the impact of such practices? What are the efforts made by the institution in giving the faculty due recognition for innovation in teaching?

- Four Faculty members of our institution have received these awards.
- The college also encourages the meritorious staff to participate in academic deliberations like National and International Seminars and Training programmes workshops to improve their innovative efficiency.

The College creates a culture of instilling and nurturing creativity and scientific temper among the students by

- Organizing Field trips / Educational tours

 - a The students of Physics and Electronics were provided on job training at Nokia care , Kurnool.
 - b The students of Chemistry attended internship programme at PET (Plastic Bottle Manufacturing) Industry, Lakshmipuram, Kurnool.
- Involving students in the cultural activities
- Encouraging the students to participate in sports/games events (this has resulted in students bringing laurels to the institution).

- Departments are provided with Computers.
- LCD Projectors and screen are provided to facilitate Computer aided teaching and learning.
- Wi-fi Internet facility is available to staff and students on the entire campus.
- The College Library has Desktop systems and internet connectivity to download study material

2.3.12 Does the College have a mechanism for evaluation of teachers by the students / alumni? If yes, how is the evaluation used in achieving qualitative improvement in the teaching-learning process?

Yes. As directed by the CCE (Commissionerate of Collegiate Education), Hyderabad, IQAC of the College obtains feedback on the performance of teachers from the students. The feedback is analyzed and suitable measures are taken. Feedback on teachers' performance is also obtained from the alumni who visit the college from time to time.

The remarks and suggestions are communicated to the teachers concerned by the Principal for the improvement of teaching learning process.

Feedback thus obtained from the students and alumni greatly help in achieving qualitative improvement in the teaching learning process.

2.3.13 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If yes elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

The academic activities are generally completed as per the schedule. The college faces problems of curriculum coverage rarely. The following are the challenges encountered by the college in completing curriculum within the planned timeframe.

- Strikes/Bandhs organized by the political parties / outside student organizations.
- Organizing inter-collegiate sports and games/tournaments.

Approaches to overcome challenges:

- The loss of working days due to these events is compensated by arranging extra classes outside the college hours.

2.3.14 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

The college has a central library. It is quite rich in Text Books, Reference Books, Periodicals, Journals, etc. It is one of the best libraries in the University area.

Library has the following facilities:

3. Journals + Back Volumes of Journals = 93
4. Reprography
5. Audio-Visual Cassettes, CDs and DVDs

These amenities can be freely accessed by the staff and the students. Because of these facilities, our teachers and students improve their academic skills and get an awareness of the other important aspects of life. The faculty also regularly makes use of the library for reference books, periodicals, journals and e-books for enhancing their subject expertise and contemporary knowledge on various issues.

In addition to this, most of the Departments have Departmental Libraries. Internet facility is also available in the library. The students and staff are immensely benefitted by this facility for downloading subject content. The library has conventional learning tools and e-learning tools. The departmental libraries prove useful for the students in many ways. New editions are added regularly and the library stock is updated with current volumes. Departments have e-books.

2.3.15 How does the institution continuously monitor, evaluate and report on the quality of teaching, teaching methods used, classroom environments and the effect on student performance?

The institution continuously monitors, evaluates and reports on the quality of teaching, teaching methods, classroom environment and the effect on the student performance in the following manner:

Monitoring:

- Random interaction with the students by the IQAC
- Review of the co-curricular activities
- Analysis of the student performance in the IAE

Evaluation:

- The API score of the faculty members

- Student feedback

Reporting:

- Intimation to the teacher concerned on specific observations if any noticed while monitoring and evaluating the quality of teaching
- Communication of the results of the college to CCE, AP
- The academic audit report is made known to each faculty member.
- Intimation of the attendance / progress of the student to the parent/guardian.

2.4 Teacher Quality:

The particulars of the faculty strength of the college are provided below.

- Faculty strength : 131
- 38 Posts are filled out of 67 posts sanctioned by A.P. Govt.
- 01 Staff Member is from outside the state.

2.4.2 How are the members of the faculty selected?

The institution invites applications from the qualified aspirants to fill the vacancies in the aided and the self-finance programmes by giving advertisements in leading newspapers.

A selection committee is constituted which comprises the Secretary & Correspondent, Management Members, Principal of the College, Subject Experts and In-charge of the Department.

The Principal, Special Officer, In-charge of the Department concerned scrutinize the applications received and prepare the list of eligible candidates to appear for an interview with all their original certificates on the specified dates.

On the day of interview, the original certificates are verified by the selection committee and the candidates are asked to give a demo followed by interview. The candidates are selected based on their performance in the interview and demo class. The selection committee recommends the selected candidates for appointment. In case of the staff selected in the aided vacancy, their proceedings are sent to the Commissionerate of Collegiate Education (CCE) Govt. of A.P Hyderabad for approval.

Examination Reforms:

The college initiated a few major evaluation reforms utilizing the academic autonomy and implemented them for ensuring quality evaluation. The following are a few examples which have positively affected the evaluation process.

Evaluation of UG courses:

- The pattern of internal assessment for 25 marks is reformed as follows:
 - i. The internal assessment in theory examination is for 20 marks.
 - ii. Attendance for 05 marks.
- Supplementary Examination for VI Semester is conducted for the regular students in the month of April/May of the academic year.
- Implementation of personal identification of Answer Scripts.
- Students are allowed to take photostat copy of valued answer scripts by paying prescribed fee of Rs. 1500/-.
- Valuation of SEE Answer scripts by the internal examiners has been introduced and the percentage of scripts to be valued is enhanced every year subject to a maximum of 50%. The scripts for valuation are allotted to senior faculty members of the college subsequently on rotation basis.
- Objective type in internal assessment examinations in certain subjects is introduced to prepare the students for the future competitive exams.

Content and Knowledge Management:

The Faculty Forum of the College conducts programmes regularly involving all the departments. The Faculty members present papers on relevant and emerging areas of research.

Yes. The College encourages the mobility of faculty members among other institutions for teaching. The faculty members are invited as resource persons by other reputed institutions to deliver guest lectures. The faculty members of other colleges are also invited as resource persons in academic programmes conducted in the college .So far there is no faculty exchange programme with national and international bodies. However experts from other states/countries are invited to deliver lectures in National/International seminars organized in the college. These academic exercises have helped in enriching the quality of the faculty members.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the College ensure that all the stakeholders are aware of the evaluation processes that are operative?

The college adopts blended evaluation process consisting of internal and external methods with 25% and 75% weightage. Two internal assessment examinations and one semester end external examination

are conducted in every semester. At the end of even semesters practical examination is conducted. The components in the internal as well as external evaluation are discussed and approved in the annual BOS meetings of the respective subjects.

The College ensures that all stakeholders are aware of the evaluation processes that are operative through the following means.

- Evaluation methods and semester-wise system explained to the 1st year students by the Principal and Controller of Examinations on Freshers' Day.
- Awareness Programme for the freshers given by the Departments.
- Posting the details on the college website: www.osmaniacollegekurnool.com
- Circulation among the departments and classes and display of Evaluation methods and periodical schedules on the notice boards of college and Examination branch.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms initiated by the College and to what extent have they been implemented in the College? Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the evaluation management system?

The college initiated a few major evaluation reforms utilizing the academic autonomy and implemented them ensuring quality evaluation. The following are a few examples:

- The pattern of internal assessment for 25 marks is reformed as follows:
 - a. The internal assessment theory examination is for 20 marks.
 - b. Attendance of students has been given the weightage of 5 marks.
- Supplementary Examination for VI Semester is conducted for regular students in the month of April/May soon after the declaration of results.
- Implementation of personal identification of Answer Scripts.
- Students are allowed to take photostat copy of valued answer scripts by paying the prescribed fee of Rs. 1500/- to ensure transparency in evaluation.
- In accordance with the recommendations of the NAAC peer team and the Governing Board, the percentage of scripts valued by Internal Examiners is enhanced every academic year. The scripts for valuation are allotted to senior faculty members of the college subsequently on rotation basis.
- Objective type questions in internal assessment examinations in certain subjects are introduced to prepare the students for the competitive examinations.

2.5.3 What measures have been taken by the institution for continuous evaluation of students and ensuring their progress and improved performance?

The following measures have been taken by the institution for continuous evaluation of students and ensuring their progress and improved performance.


- Conduct of two internal assessment examinations in every semester by the examination branch as per the schedule.
- Candidate who fail to secure the minimum pass marks are given a chance to appear for the supplementary examination.
- Conduct of Classroom Seminars, Group Discussions and Quiz Programmes by the faculty concerned.
- Giving written assignments on different topics based on the library / internet learning resources.
- In the case of class seminars, the teachers concerned share their observations on the process, content, presentation and offer guidance for better performance.

2.5.4 What percentage of marks is earmarked for continuous internal assessment? Indicate the mechanisms strategized to ensure rigour of the internal assessment process?

25 % of marks are earmarked for continuous internal assessment. The distribution of internal marks is as follows in each paper:

The mechanisms strategized to ensure rigour of internal assessment process are indicated below:

- The candidates have to secure a minimum of 35% in the internal evaluation for getting award of the degree.
- The students have to take two Internal Assessment Tests and the higher of the two tests is considered while awarding internal marks.
- Two IAEs are conducted facilitating the students who miss to take any test due to participation in extra-curricular activities or for the reasons of ill-health at the time of internal tests.
- The regularity and class room interaction are taken into consideration while assessing the performance in the aforesaid internal evaluation.
- The internal tests are conducted strictly as per the schedule.
- The internal scripts are strictly valued by the teachers concerned paying scrupulous attention to relevant and factual details.
- The marks secured are declared to every student and the valued answer scripts are open for verification by the students in case of any grievance.

2.5.5 Does the College adhere to the declared examination schedules? If not, what measures have been taken to address the delay?

Yes. The college strictly adheres to the declared examination schedules. Very rarely the dates of one or two internal tests are changed / postponed due to strikes initiated by the political and student organizations and conducted at the end.

2.5.6 What is the average time taken by the College for declaration of examination results? Indicate the mode / media adopted by the College for the publication of examination results e.g., website, SMS, email, etc.

Declaration of Results – Average time: 15 days

UG Programmes:

The average time taken by the college for declaration of examination results is as follows:

- The Final Year results are announced within 15 days from the conduct of last Semester End Examinations.
- Display of class-wise and group-wise results on the Exam Branch notice board.
- Posting of results on the college website www.osmaniacollegekurnool.com

2.5.7 Does the college have an integrated examination platform for the following processes?

- Pre-examination processes – Time table generation, OMR, student list generation, invigilators, squads, attendance sheet, online payment gateway, etc.
- Examination process – Examination material management, logistics.
- Post examination process – attendance capture, OMR based exam result, auto processing, generic result processing and certification.

Yes. The college has an integrated examination platform in the form of software package developed for the following:

Pre-examination processes:

- The Examination Time-table is prepared well in advance and circulated among all the students.
- The question papers for SEE are set by external examiners. This process is undertaken by the Examination branch a month before the commencement of examinations.
- The copies of the printed question papers are sent to the Chief Superintendent in sealed covers.
- The students register for semester examination is maintained.
- The prescribed application forms are duly attested by the lecturer / head of the department concerned.
- The list of eligible students is prepared based on the college attendance records.
- Hall tickets are prepared by Examination branch based on the submitted application forms.
- The hall tickets are issued to the students three days prior to the commencement of examinations.
- The list of invigilators is finalized and a meeting of invigilators is convened by the Chief Superintendent for the effective conduct of the examinations.
- Some senior faculty members are appointed as members of the Internal Squads, who go round the examination halls to ensure smooth and fair conduct of the examinations.
- A panel of examiners for various subjects is finalized for central valuation by Examination branch.

Examination process:

- The Gallery for seating arrangement is handed over to the Chief Superintendent by the Examination branch for making suitable hall arrangements.
- The Chief Superintendent collects the answer sheets, sealed question paper packets and other examination related material from Examination branch.
- The question papers, in sealed covers, are opened by the Chief Superintendent in the presence of the invigilators, half-an-hour prior to the commencement of the examination. The question papers are distributed to the invigilators according to the allotment made.
- The attendance of the candidates is recorded.
- The Chief Superintendent makes a visit to the examination halls to oversee the alertness of invigilators and smooth conduct of the examinations.
- Utmost care and active supervision ensure not only the smooth conduct of examinations but also prevents any malpractice during the examination.
- Any incident of malpractice detected by the invigilator /internal squad is brought to the notice of the Chief Superintendent for initiation of further action.
- After the examination, the answer scripts are handed over to the Chief Superintendent.
- The answer scripts are verified, arranged, packed and the covers are sealed in the presence of the Chief Superintendent.
- The sealed answer packets are then handed over to the Examination Branch.

Post examination process:

- The answer scripts after coding are sent for valuation to external examiners and 30% of scripts are earmarked for internal valuation.
- After valuation the scripts are scrutinized and decoded
- The paper-wise marks of student are computerized.
- Utmost care is taken to maintain confidentiality during the entire process of evaluation.
- The results are published by the Examination branch with the concurrence of the Principal.
- The consolidated mark sheets and other necessary documents of the final year students who have passed all the papers are sent to the Controller of Examinations, Rayalaseema University, Kurnool, for the issue of provisional / degree certificates.

2.5.8 Has the College introduced any reforms in its Ph.D. evaluation process?

- The research programmes are not offered by the college.

2.5.9 What efforts are made by the College to streamline the operations at the Office of the Controller of Examinations? Mention any significant efforts which have improved process and functioning of the examination division/section?

- The following are the significant efforts made by the college to streamline the operations at the Office of the Controller of Examinations.
- Examination Schedule of the IAE and SEE is prepared and announced at the beginning of the academic year.
- The Controller of Examinations is constantly assisted by the Assistant Controller of Examinations.
- Efforts are made to obtain the required question papers from external sources in time and are set ready for conduct of the examinations as per the schedule.
- Every piece of information is computerized by qualified and experienced computer operators and utmost confidentiality is maintained.
- State-of-the-art printing machines and the valuation by the external examiners have greatly improved the functioning of the Student Evaluation Division.
- The Principal acts as the Chief Superintendent and also custodian of Question Papers.
- Internal Squad is constituted to make surprise visits to the examination halls for the smooth and fair conduct of the examination.
- A separate committee is constituted to look into the cases of malpractices.
- Immediately after the examination, the coded answer books are sent to the examiners in sealed covers for valuation.
- After valuation, the scripts are scrutinized and decoded.
- The paper-wise marks of students are computerized.
- Results are declared and marks memos are issued.
- The consolidated marks sheets and other necessary documents of the final year students who have passed all the papers are sent to the Controller of Examination, Rayalaseema University, Kurnool, for the issue of provisional / degree certificates.

2.5.9 What is the mechanism for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation?

Every care is taken by the Examination Branch to satisfy the students in all aspects and avoid any type of inconvenience to them regarding evaluation. However, a few students present their grievances for redressal.

The following mechanism is adopted for the redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation.

- The Controller of Examinations is empowered to deal with the grievances related to issues of evaluation.
- The identified internal problems are solved immediately.
- There is a provision for the revaluation of answer scripts on the payment of Rs. 200/- per paper within 15 days from the date of declaration of the results.
- Rectification: Any discrepancy in the results declared and marks memos issued is brought to the notice of the Examination branch for further action and rectification.
- Personal Identification: A candidate may apply for personal identification of his/her answer scripts of any subject and paper within 15 days after the publication of the Semester results. A photo copy of the valued answer script is provided to the student after payment of the prescribed fee.
- Revaluation: A candidate may also apply for revaluation of any paper within 15 days from the date of publication of results. If the difference is more than 20%, the answer scripts will be sent for third valuation. The marks obtained in the third valuation stands good.

- Advanced learners are encouraged to undertake Study Projects and are guided to actively participate in various competitive events such as elocution competitions, Science Fairs and presentation of papers in various Seminars and Conferences.
- A majority of teachers have discovered that their mentoring based on variety of evaluation tests and individual performance has paid rich dividends.
- Absence of active listening skills, lack of diligence, docility, resentfulness and disobedient attitude towards learning are barriers which have been addressed on an individual basis.

Yes. The college has a Research Committee to encourage and support the teaching staff to undertake research by allowing them to apply for projects and attending relevant programs. The institution has constituted a Research Committee (RC). The committee comprises the Principal as Chairman, a senior teacher as the convener and others with research aptitude as members. The Research Committee facilitates and monitors the research oriented activities like presentation of research papers at National and International Conferences and publication of research articles in peer reviewed journals of National and International repute. It also encourages the members of the staff to submit proposals for Minor/Major research projects of UGC and other funding agencies. The committee meets twice a year, suggests ways and monitors research activities, reviews various matters pertaining to the research projects, publications, and utilization of funds received by the UGC.

The objectives of the RC are to

- Motivate teachers to undertake minor and major research projects, and help them in submitting proposals to UGC / other funding agencies for minor and major projects.
- Encourage publications by teachers.
- Encourage teachers to participate and organize seminars, symposia, conferences and workshops
- Give information relating to national and international seminars, workshops, conferences etc.
- Monitor the progress of Research projects.
- Provide information to teaching staff about the various funding agencies.
- Encourage interdisciplinary research.
- Motivate the faculty of each department to publish articles in the National and International peer reviewed journals.
- Check the proper utilization of funds released for the purpose.

Impact:

- Faculty members who have registered for research are enabled to carry out research activities during free time.
- Funds are sanctioned for the purchase of books and journals in the areas concerned.
- The Management and Principal always encourage the faculty to pursue research activity for M.Phil., Ph.D.
- The Management encourages selected student study projects by providing Rs.500.00 for each.

The grants received from the UGC are used to purchase books and journals, equipments, chemicals and other relevant materials required for research activities. The science laboratories are well maintained and well equipped to facilitate research. The students can use other departmental laboratories if they require. The respective departments collaborate with various external agencies, universities, industries, NGOs and libraries. It helps the students to avail themselves of the

infrastructural facilities available in the external sources. The college has provided some major equipment and has established significant research facilities in the thrust areas of research.

The following facilities are developed on the campus:

- Internet Centre in the Library for the benefit of students and staff
- Computerized library system.
- Well equipped computer lab.
- All Science departments are provided with modern equipment for research
- Extension of library building (Separate Reading Hall)
- Departmental Libraries.
- Updated knowledge is available through the number of e-Journals and e-books from INFLIBNET; N-List. The Library has improved its knowledge discovery procedures with better connectivity and has increased the number of subscriptions to journals. It has provided better access to e-journals and e-books through National Library and Information Services Infrastructure and Scholarly Content (N-LIST). The library website facilitates the researchers to use various web links available in the open access domain.
- DTP facilities are provided to the researchers.

Yes. The college has information resource centre to cater to the needs of researchers. The college provides facilities like Internet, well equipped computer labs, departmental and college central libraries and research Journals. 

3.6 Extension Activities and Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR) :

3.6.1 How does the College sensitize the faculty and students on Institutional Social Responsibilities? List the social outreach programmes which have created an impact on students' campus experience.

- The college was established with a mission to create awareness among the people about their rights and to empower them through education ushering in holistic development of human personality. It has been providing education to those who need it the most as a

large number of students come from the rural background and are educationally and socially backward.

- Our endeavour has been to bridge the demographic differences with knowledge and higher education. The institute is conscious of its role and commitment to society in producing enlightened citizens and holistic development of human personality.
- The college has a policy of involving experts/ specialists from different disciplines to contribute to the content of the awareness on health, hygiene, women empowerment and rights of women. Tree plantation and Shramadan programmes have been carried out on the college campus.
- The college has organized a protest march to make people become more sensitized to the strict laws relating to child abuse.
- Littering and use of plastics are banned on the campus.
- Motor vehicle free day is observed on the campus on the last Saturday of every month to create environment awareness of pollution.
- More than 300 students of our college are members of AP Green Corps of Forest Department. They have planted the saplings during Vanamahostavam on the campus and in their households.
- Some of our staff members help the meritorious and poor students through Endowment scholarships.
- The college has promoted Save Hundri Movement, to protect the river Hundri.
- College students and staff have participated in candle light rally against Peshawar massacre.
- Members of the staff and students are encouraged to donate saplings to the neighboring schools/colleges to enhance eco-friendly environment.
- The International Women's Day is celebrated to create gender awareness.
- Eco Club of the college has channelled students towards conservation practices. The members are exhorted to take a leading role in safeguarding the existing flora and fauna.
- Environmental awareness rallies are conducted as part of Environment Day Celebrations.
- Swachh Bharat programmes are conducted on the campus. The Management, the Staff, and the students take part in these programmes.
- Swachh Bharat programmes are also conducted in adopted villages by NSS volunteers.
- The college has adopted two nearby villages Venkaya Palli and Stantanpuram for NSS activity. An annual camp is conducted in these villages for 7 days and students are exposed to the conditions existing in these villages. Students take up manual work like

repairing of roads, cleaning the drains, (Shramadanam), tree plantation and clearing weeds. They also conduct surveys on socio economic issues at the village level in order to gain awareness of the reality and problems of rural India.

- Our NSS volunteers also take part in tree plantation drives from time to time. NSS women volunteers also actively participate in these camps. These camps keep our campus and surrounding localities clean, green and hygienic. Awareness programmes on HIV/AIDS, Environment, sanitation, hygiene, free health camps are conducted. During these camps lectures are given on topics like moral education, human rights, women empowerment, environment, etc. Besides these activities, the NCC cadets and NSS volunteers regularly organize Blood Donation Camps with the help of Red Cross society, Kurnool. NCC cadets are always ready to attend to any blood donation call to serve the patients/needily in emergency.
- The institution promotes institution-neighbourhood-community network and student engagement by conducting various social outreach programmes like Awareness on Human rights, Awareness on AIDS, Celebrating National festivals and arranging talks on Freedom Fighters & Freedom Movement.
- The volunteers of NSS, POs and NCC cadets in collaboration with RTA, Police and Eenadu have conducted awareness programmes on road safety.
- Besides, the units of NCC, NSS and students of Red Ribbon club, Youth, Red Cross also organize and participate in various social outreach programmes outside the college.
- The NSS units and NCC cadets have visited the orphanage home “Home for hope” and distributed the necessary materials.
- The Department of Human Values and Professional Ethics has organized social outreach programmes by visiting the orphanage “Joy Home” and distributing essential commodities.
- Our endeavor has been to help maximum number of students, especially from rural areas and the weaker sections of society to have access to higher education.
- Through the study of foundation courses like Human Values and Professional Ethics, Indian Constitution, Environmental Studies, the students are sensitized to various social issues, moral values and their responsibilities.
- The institute is conscious of its role in campus community connection, wellbeing of its neighborhood and has initiated a number of community developmental activities.
- Important days like Environment Day (June 05), Human Rights Day (Dec 10), Hiroshima Day (Aug 6 – 9), National Education Day, Independence Day (Aug 15) , Consumer Rights day (Dec 24),

Republic Day (Jan 26), Communal Harmony Day and Flag Day, World Disability Day (Dec 3), Vigilance Awareness Week, etc. are observed. These activities create awareness of issues of human rights, Women's rights, Children's rights, Dalit rights, Environmental Rights and Rights of people with disabilities, importance of the Indian Constitution, rights and duties of Indian citizens, and problems of vulnerable sections of society.

3.6.2 How does the College promote College-neighborhood network and student engagement, contributing to holistic development of students and sustained community development?

- To promote college-neighborhood network, the students and members of the staff participate in various activities.
- The major strength of this college is its ability to ensure holistic development of students to make them enlightened citizens. It aims to pursue excellence towards creating manpower with high degree of intellectual, professional and cultural development to meet the national and global challenges.
- The college has four NSS units consisting of 400 volunteers actively participating in the extension activities of the college. They also conduct special camps in nearby villages for a week and organize various awareness programmes on social, environmental, economical and other health related issues for the benefit of the rural community.
- Besides the contribution to the intellectual development of students, the networking with neighboring institutions provides enormous scope for developing values like concern for fellowmen, sharing and caring, teamwork, leadership and skills.
- The faculty is frequently called upon to deliver lectures in various schools and colleges, both within the city and outside. They also participate in talks and interviews on radio and TV.
- Medical camps, health awareness programmes, cultural festivals, inter-college sports meets, literary programmes, rural development programmes, etc. are organized.
- Minority Girls whose education is low in Kurnool are mostly benefitted along with other girl students. The institution has brought about awareness of the importance of women education during the Parents Meet, through women empowerment cell programmes and other programmes which resulted in the gradual increase of educational and job opportunities to the women students to meet the national and global challenges.
- Staff and students visit the hospitals on Founder's Day and distribute the necessary materials/fruits to the patients.

The college provides its buildings and campus for various community development activities:

- The college has a branch of Central Bank of India and a Post Office on the campus for staff, students and the general public.
- College provides its playgrounds and auditoriums for educational use to neighboring institutions under certain conditions.
- Every year Kurnool Premier League T 20-20 cricket tournament is organized in the college. Former Indian Cricket Captain Mohd. Azharuddin was the chief guest for KPL 2014.
- The college buildings and infrastructure are utilized for the conduct of APPSC departmental examinations, Ed.CET, EAMCET, B.Ed Examination, Staff Selection Commission and other examinations.
- The college has IGNOU study centre and JKC.
- College campus is utilised for conducting public meetings, community programmes and Mass Marriages.
- Walkers from the surrounding areas make use of playgrounds regularly.
- The college playground is let out to neighboring communities on weekends.
- College premises are used for Election Training classes /booths/strong rooms for EVMs, Enrollment of Voters ID, Ration cards and Aadhar cards, etc.
- College campus is used for the conduct of Eye camp by Vasan Eye Care, Kurnool, for staff, students and public.
- The college has a Regional Centre for Educational Development of Minorities.
- The followings camps are conducted in collaboration with network neighbourhood. A Mega Health Camp was conducted in collaboration with SV foundation. Eye Testing Camp was organized by Modern Eye hospital.
- Aids Rally is organized in collaboration with DAPCU and plantation programme is organized in collaboration with Forest Department.

3.6.3 How does the College promote the participation of students and faculty in extension activities including participation in NSS, NCC, YRC and other National/ International agencies?

- At the beginning of each academic year, the Programme Officers of NSS unit and NCC Officer brief the students about the aims, objectives and academic as well as career benefits and subsequently students are enrolled for these units. Academic and

career benefits are also discussed with the students who wish to participate in these activities.

- The college has a very pro active NSS unit with a membership of more than 400 volunteers. Various programmes and special camps are organized by NSS unit with focus on instilling social sensitivity and leadership qualities among students. The college encourages students to take part in NSS and NCC activities..
- The NSS units coordinate with the local bodies in conducting extension activities like awareness campaigns on diseases, epidemics, sanitation etc., A village is identified for social service and during the annual camp the volunteers help resolve various issues concerning the civic amenities.
- The participation of students and faculty in extension activities is promoted in collaboration with various departments and sports and cultural committees of the college.
- The NCC of the college has one company with **200** cadets. The cadets participate in various camps like Republic Day, army attachment, trekking, national integration, Thal sainik, mountaineering, annual training, leadership camps, advanced leadership camps, personality development camps besides organizing various rallies.

The Indira Gandhi National Open University (IGNOU), regional study centre established in 1989, (0108) strives to build an inclusive knowledge society through inclusive education. It provides distance mode of education.

Alumni association:

It promotes an enduring relationship between old students and their alma mater. Annual meetings provide a platform to recognize

outstanding achievements, provide scholarship, and help in placements of the students, and in overall development of the college and society.

Gymnasium:

Along with the academic activities the college has a mission to provide physical fitness facilities. The College has established well equipped gymnasium with the cooperation of alumni.

Eco club:

Eco club is formed in the college to motivate the students to keep their surroundings green and clean by undertaking plantation of trees (Forest Department provides free saplings from its nurseries). It promote ethos of conservation of water by minimizing the use of water. Students are made to bring about awareness among the public and sanitary workers of the indiscriminate burning of waste which causes respiratory diseases. It sensitizes the students to minimize the use of plastic bags(use of plastic bags is banned in Kurnool by the Municipal Corporation), not to throw them in public places as they choke drains and sewers, cause water logging and provide breeding ground for mosquitoes. The Eco club organizes tree plantation programmes, other programmes such as Quiz, Essay writing, painting competitions, rallies, etc. to bring about awareness of various environmental issues and to educate students and public about re-use of waste material & preparation of products out of the waste.

A database of voluntary blood donors is generated to facilitate blood donation during emergency. Collaboration with other agencies, bodies and institutions is the need of the present time. There is a need to explore the expertise of other institutions to improve the quality of teaching learning programme. Keeping this in view, continuous efforts have been made at college, department and individual faculty level to form collaboration with other agencies and institutions.

- The department of Physics has collaboration with Rayalaseema University, Kurnool.



➤ Curriculum development: Linkage with various agencies helps update the curriculum according to the requirement of current needs of the society.

- Internship, On-Job-Training: The Departments of Physics, Commerce and Chemistry use their contacts with various organizations for the internship of their students in their respective subjects.
- Faculty exchange and development: Each department organizes guest lectures and seminars in which resource persons from other institutions and universities are invited. Our faculty members also visit other colleges and give guest lectures and act as resource persons. Two members of the department of Botany participated in International seminar in Sri Lanka.
- Research & Publication: The faculty members of various departments actively engage themselves in research activities in collaboration with other universities/institutions and publish research articles in reputed national and international journals. The Department of Telugu in collaboration with CIIL and Department of Telugu, Mahatma Gandhi Institute, Mauritius organized an International Seminar followed by the Publication of seminar proceedings.
- Consultancy & Extension: The Department of Botany has offered consultancy services to local pharmacy colleges for identification of medicinal plants. The Department of Commerce provides consultancy to college staff in filing the IT returns. The staff, NCC cadets, NSS volunteers, Management actively participate in various extension activities in collaboration with local bodies and communities.
- Student placement: The placement cell was established in 2005 with the objectives of providing suitable placement to meritorious students of the institution in the reputed companies. The placement cell is in regular contact with the MNCs for recruitment drives.

- Well maintained students run Hostel named “Hyderabad House” was in existence for about 50 years. However, the hostel was closed due to mushrooming growth of the colleges and uneconomic strength of the inmates.

- Both the campuses are located in the heart of the town with an easy access to transportation from all corners of the city.
- Presently, the college facilitates the provision of accommodation in the hostels run by Social Welfare Departments, Minority Department of Government of Andhra Pradesh.
- Most of the students stay in social-welfare hostels, working women's hostels with paying guest accommodation, students' managed hostels, and community based hostels, while many students coming from rural areas go home after the class work is over. However, women students are accommodated in two private hostels which are adjacent to women's campus.
- The college has an MOU with Dr. M. Abdul Huq Unani Medical College for accommodating girl students in their hostel.
- Against this backdrop, the college plans to have the hostel, if need arises in the near future.

- The college has an MOU with K.M. Hospitals, located in front of the College Main gate which works 24X7 on all days.

- Medical leave is sanctioned to the needy staff members. In addition to this, the women staff members are also granted maternity leave.

- The students also exhibit their skills in the cultural programmes conducted during many functions in the college.
- The college provides makeup material, orchestra instruments, decorative lighting, and training by professionals in dance and music in order to promote interest in cultural events.
- Students participating in cultural activities are awarded special prizes on the College day.


The functions of the Library committee are:

- Extension of work schedule in times of need.



- Training programmes in soft skills are conducted.
- Books on personality development / soft skills / social skills development are made available to the students in the College library.
- Students participate in Skill Development Programmes organised by A.P Skill Development Corporation in collaboration with Rayalaseema University, Kurnool.

a) Overseas students:

- The college does not have overseas students on rolls.

b) Physically challenged / differently abled students

- The differently abled/physically challenged students are given preference in admission. They are helped by their teachers and non-teaching staff in the classrooms and laboratories. Separate seating arrangement is made for them during the examinations.
- The institution provides ramps, lift facility, separate toilets, Braille material and scribe facility.
- The institution in collaboration with the ALUMNI provides tricycles.

c) SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections

- The students are provided scholarships from State Government. Fee concession and exemption are given by the Management Committee.

d) Students to participate in various competitions/ conferences in India and abroad

- Students are encouraged and motivated to participate in various competitions, seminars, conferences and workshops. .

- The management provides financial assistance to the students participating in various academic/ cultural/ sports events.
- As per the instructions of CCE, Hyderabad, the students participating in Yuvatarangam are reimbursed TA & DA from special fee funds.

e) Health centre, Health insurance

- The college has MOUs with K.M Hospitals and Dr. M. Abdul Haq Unani Medical College, Kurnool.
- The Management is contemplating to initiate the process of providing Health Insurance facility under Janata Scheme.

f) Skill development (spoken English, Computer literacy etc.)

- The language laboratories are set-up to train the students in developing their spoken English and soft skills.
- Three computer labs are established for computer literacy of the students.
- Our students are trained under NSDC by Rayalaseema University, Kurnool.
- The students are exposed to Internship/Hands-on Training and Entrepreneurship skills from various offices/firms/agencies.
- Intensive training is provided by JKC.

g) Performance enhancement for slow learners/students who are at risk of failure and dropouts.

- Remedial coaching classes are conducted for slow learners.
- Special counselling is provided for the dropouts who face financial restraints. Their cases are recommended to the management for fee concession and exemption.
- The staff also helps such students financially.

h) Exposure of students to other institutions of higher learning / corporate / business houses etc.

The students of Commerce & Management, Computer Science and other departments are provided with

- Hands-on training
- Internship.
- Field trips
- Visit to local industries.

i) Publication of student magazines

Yes. The students are encouraged to contribute articles, poems, short stories in English, Hindi, Telugu, Urdu languages to e-Journal 'Jagruti'.

Yes. The students are given guidance to prepare for all competitive examinations. A free coaching centre for minority students by Regional Centre for Minorities Development (RCEDM), Govt. of Andhra Pradesh has been functional since 1994.

Special dietary requirements, sports uniform and materials:

- Fees concession is extended to them. Sports kits and uniforms are provided to them free of cost.

Any other:

- Conducting internal exams separately for the students who fail to take exams on the schedule due to their involvement in the activities.
- Visually challenged/hearing impaired students are also given exemption with regard to minimum qualifying marks in the examination.





Appeared and Pass Comparison




UG Success Rate (%)

Organization's management system development, implementation and continuous improvement:

- The highest decision making body of the Institution is Management Committee of Osmania College. The Management Committee consists of President, Secretary & Correspondent and other members, Principal is an ex-officio member.
- The Committee formulates policy decisions on admission and appointment of staff, resource mobilization, and development of infrastructure & learning resources.
- The Governing Body and the Academic Council consisting of the members from the administration and academics discuss / frame the plans and policies, goals and objectives.
- The Governing Body consists of Management Committee members, Principal, Vice principal, nominees of University and UGC
- All the proposals submitted by Board of Studies, Academic Council, Staff Council and other Committees/Cells formulated as per UGC/University norms are considered by the governing body and timely decisions are taken and implemented for smooth functioning of all the departments.
- The Governing body keenly analyses the faculty appraisal reports as well as the recommendations of IQAC to keep pace with modern times and thereby continuously supervise in upgrading the teaching and learning resource. The Governing body encourages the faculty members to have their teaching skills in tune with the global standards.
- The Correspondent and the Principal monitor the annual staff appraisal, efforts made by IQAC for academic development of faculty and student community and other measures to reinforce the culture of excellence.
- The leadership also focuses on identifying the potential of students through various academic, sports and cultural events.

- The Principal conducts frequent staff-council meetings and meetings with the administrative departments respectively. Thereby, the needs of various departments are timely identified and further efforts are made to fulfill the same.
- The Management evaluates the academic and administrative growth of the institution every year through BOS meetings, Academic Council, IQAC.

Interaction with stakeholders:

- The Institution ensures reaching out to the stakeholders in the most amicable way.
- The traditional mentoring system ensures the connect with teachers and students.
- The Parent-Teacher Association meetings are frequently held.
- The Placement Cell ensures connect with the corporate and potential employers.
- The Alumni Association plays a key role in bringing back the Alumni to the campus.
- Every department of the institution has a BOS, with due representation of subject experts from University and other colleges, Alumni and Industrialists whose interaction is quite helpful in the syllabi revision and curriculum development.

Reinforcing the culture of excellence:

- Culture for excellence is practised at the Institution through creating internal benchmarks and surpassing them. This is a dynamic process wherein suggestions and innovations are implemented, tried and tested, reviewed and reformed. Every activity on campus is planned with a check list and a multi-level supervision.
- Students are given enough freedom to innovate, execute and learn from their experiences. Every year the meritorious students, NCC Cadets, NSS volunteers, Sportspersons are honoured with prizes/medals/awards/certificates/mementoes/ incentives on the College Day function.
- The College has established an effective monitoring mechanism through the coordination between the Teaching & Non-teaching staff under the leadership of the Principal.
- Key responsibilities are passed on in rotation to a new person making way for fresh ideas and thoughts. Innovating and exploring new avenues and adopting the best, has been ingrained into the culture of the College.

Thus all the above activities reinforce culture of excellence on the campus.

Identifying organizational needs and Championing organizational development:

- The Institution is driven by progressive change by identifying organizational needs and championing organizational development. The Organizational development is carried out by feedback from stakeholders (students, parents, staff and alumni), promotion of research activities, encouragement and support to organize seminars, workshops etc.

Yes, all the positions in various statutory bodies of the College are filled timely as per the norms of College Management, which in turn follows the timely GOs of Commissionerate of Collegiate Education, Hyderabad, Guidelines of UGC and Rayalaseema University, Kurnool. Meetings are conducted regularly at the stipulated intervals.

6.1.6 Does the College promote a culture of participative management? If yes, indicate the levels of participative management.

A three level participative management operates in the college viz. Management Level, Faculty Level and Student Level.

- Management, Heads of Departments and senior faculty members have representation on the Academic Council, Governing body and Board of Studies. Faculty members offer their suggestions for the healthy growth of the Institution.
- The faculty members get representation on various committees like admission committee, purchase committee, maintenance committee, sports committee and cultural activities committee. They are also encouraged to participate in various other events like departmental seminars, tour programmes etc.
- Representation is given for the students in all committees like College Calendar and Magazine, Library, Games and Sports Committees, English Literary Association, Telugu Bhasha Samiti, Hindi Bhasha Samiti and Bazm-e-Urdu. Thus the promotion of a culture of participative management has significantly helped the College to achieve academic excellence.

6.1.7 Give details of the academic and administrative leadership provided by the University to the College?

- The College being Autonomous, each department has a scope to modify the University syllabus by a maximum of 20% in the beginning of the every academic year keeping in view the employability of the students in different fields, and according to the needs and demands of the society.
- The syllabus of each subject is scrutinized and finalized every year by the members of the BOS. Internal members from the same college, external members from other colleges and a nominee from the University are invited to the BOS meetings every year. After discussions in BOS on the syllabi of both theory and practical, the syllabus of each department is finalized. This in turn is endorsed by the Academic council by University representatives and eminent academicians.
- Convocation degree certificates are issued by the Rayalaseema University, Kurnool, at the behest of the College.
- The affiliating university nominates senior Professors as members to the respective BOS and Academic Council.

6.1.8 How does the College groom the leadership at various levels?

- The College Management has constituted different bodies/committees for proper and smooth functioning of the College, namely Academic Council, Board of Studies, IQAC, Finance Committee etc.
- Committees/Cells are constituted namely Grievance and Redressal Cell, Anti-Ragging cell, Anti-Women's Harassment Cell, Anti-Sexual Harassment and Redressal Cell, Women Empowerment Cell etc.
- The membership and chairmanship on the above mentioned Committees/Cells are given to faculty members of different departments in rotation according to their seniority. Hence, College Management grooms the faculty members to develop leadership at various levels.
- Faculty members are also groomed to take leadership in organizing conferences, seminars, field visits and various cultural and sports events at State/National/International levels.
- Besides this, staff members are given opportunity to lead various internal committees e.g. different committees formed to celebrate the College Day function, Sports meets, Cultural Events, etc.
- Non-teaching staff members under the leadership of Principal and Superintendent play a significant role in the smooth functioning of Administrative work of the college
- Participation of students in NCC, NSS and other Committees provide them lot of opportunities to develop leadership qualities.

6.1.9 Has the College evolved any strategy for knowledge management? If yes, give details.

The knowledge management is a combination of information management, communication and human resources.

- All the students and staff have access to computer and internet facility in the Library. Some of the staff have access to computer and internet facility in their Department itself.
- JKC, IQAC, Departments, Placement Cell communicate regularly through emails.
- Notices and circulars are displayed on notice boards.
- The library also provides access to e-books.
- A link has been provided in the college website to access e-content.
- Library has subscribed to many Scientific, National and International journals.
- Knowledge based articles, Newspaper clippings are displayed on the notice boards of the Departments.

- Library resources largely help students to have exposure not only to regular books but to various sources like References, National and International Journals / e-journals on Internet.
- 18 Minor research projects are completed during the years of assessment. There are 07 ongoing Minor Research Projects and 01 Major Research Project.
- Research related to Ph.D. is also encouraged. During the years of assessment two Ph.Ds and one M.Phil. are awarded.
- During the period of assessment, the faculty members participated in 398 National and 69 International seminars, 46 National and 04 International workshops.

Contributing to National Development:

Thus the Institution continuously contributes towards the National development.
- The contribution of the NCC, NSS units for National Development can be judged through the effective implementation of various social programs like International Volunteers Day (SAVE HUNDRI), Swachh Bharath Abhiyan, National Voters Day, National Integration Day, World Aids Day, World Tourism Day, National Consumer Day, International Disabled Day, etc.
- NCC Cadets participate in the different National level camps like National Integration Camps, National Trekking Camps and bring name and fame to the Institution at the State and National level.

Fostering Global Competencies among Students:

- The students have access to Library resources like references, National and International Journals / e-journals.
- The Institution also encourages all departments to organize Quiz, Guest lectures, Field trips, Study Tours, Seminars and conferences

where students get the opportunity to interact with the Scientists, Industrialists, Academicians and can develop Global Competence and update the requisite skills.

Inculcating a Sound Value System among Students:

- Freshers' Day/Induction Programme for all freshers of both UG and PG is organized by the Institution. This programme itself brings all students with varied academic backgrounds, and cultural diversity together and the programme results in a deep sense of connectivity and appreciation for one another.
- The Founder's Day Celebration open to all Osmanians is a platform to express their gratitude towards their founder. Such events do strengthen traditions and value system of the college.

Promoting use of technology:

- The Institution always tries to keep pace with latest technology. Hence, the use of technology has helped the library to preserve rare manuscripts. The library is computerized. The use of Soul 2.0 Software provides easy access to all the students and staff towards library resources.
- The college library has continuous subscription and access for National and International e-journals.
- All the teachers are encouraged to use the LCD projectors and the Multimedia. Thus teaching, learning and evaluation process is largely benefitted with the promotion of the use of technology.
- The laboratories of the Institution and IQAC Conference hall have LEDs which reduce the electricity consumption.

Quest for Excellence:

- The effective functioning of IQAC is a step towards the quest for excellence through quality enhancement initiatives and sustenance.

Yes the Institution has a perspective plan for development. The plan is primarily based on the college vision and mission statement

Teaching and learning:

- Since the college has autonomous status, it revises and redesigns the syllabi and curricula.
- The teaching staff prepares an academic plan which includes necessary provision for curricular and co-curricular activities.
- They also prepare teaching aids like PPTs, Handouts, and observation materials for Practicals.
- All faculty members are encouraged to generate e-content from internet for their respective subjects.
- Student seminars and project works, assignments, internal assessment examinations, participation in co-curricular and extracurricular activities are planned and implemented.

- The UG & PG students are encouraged to appear for competitive exams.
- These academic activities will be structured to give significant exposure to students regarding recent trends in latest technology to face the challenges in global scenario.

Research and development:

- The institution recognizes the linkage between teaching and research. The management has a research policy which outlines different strategies for promoting research aptitude and skills among faculty members and students.
- 18 Minor Research Projects are completed during the years of assessment. There are 01 Major Research Project and 07 ongoing Minor Research Projects.
- The Research Committee monitors the research activities.
- Faculty members and students are encouraged for paper presentations.
- Encouraging publications by faculty and students.
- Student study projects are encouraged.
- To invite experts from industry and institutions to enrich the learners.
- Library is automated with SOUL 2.0
- The Library is the information resource center with sufficient research journals, e-journals, e-books and internet facility to cater to the needs of researchers.

Community engagement:

- Community is the important stakeholder and hence Institutional activities are focused on community welfare. The Institution is engaged in community activities through NSS volunteers and NCC cadets by visiting surroundings villages. Awareness programmes through rallies are organized on AIDS, dangerous effects of tobacco chewing and smoking, communicable diseases, polio vaccination etc.
- NSS and NCC also conduct free medical and health camps, blood donation camps as a part of Institutional Social Responsibility.
- Students regularly visit orphanages, old-age homes as a part of social outreach programme.
- Donations are collected to help the victims of natural calamities. These activities promote institution-neighborhood network and sustained community development.

Human resource planning and development:

- The Management of the College streamlines the human resource development and management activities.

- The Management of the College takes care of appointments, leaves, increments, and promotions of the faculty members.
- The number of posts required by the Departments concerned is the basis for human resource planning and development. The qualifications and experience are taken into consideration for the selection of the teaching staff.
- The Management of the College has been showing tremendous interest to promote teacher quality.
- Teachers are encouraged to pursue research.

- Institution plans to strengthen the Institution-Industry relations.
- The Institution invites entrepreneurs and industrialists to the campus. Interactive sessions, industrial visits are arranged to impart skills to understand the latest trends in business and industry
- The industry experts are included in the BOS meetings of the department. The College facilitates industries coming to the campus for job recruitment through the portals of the Placement Cell.
- Invites successful entrepreneurs for creating awareness among students on the value of self – employment.

- Presently, Institution has developed international contacts in terms of MOUs by the Departments of Chemistry and Telugu.
- Alumni, currently holding prestigious positions abroad visit the Institution and inspire the students.
- The Institution has a healthy relationship with alumni employed in other countries and involves them in the growth and development of the institution in getting their support in offering scholarships for the needy, besides sharing their expertise with the students.
- Tahera Rasheed Auditorium in Women's parallel sections was constructed by an alumna of the Institution.
- The Chemistry Laboratory was refurbished after 2nd October 2009 floods by an alumna working with HOLCIM, Dubai.

- Academic Audit Committee


These committees are headed by Principal as the Chairperson. These committees advise the Principal as and when necessary on specific issues.


- The Principal is the head of the Institution.
- All Academic issues are decided by him in consultation with the Staff council, Board of Studies and Academic Council and IQAC.
- The Heads of the Departments have their own meetings in the respective departments and they assist the Principal in day-to-day administration.
- The college office functions under the administrative control of the Principal.
- Finances of the college are handled by two banks viz., Central Bank of India and Bank of India Extension Counters.
- Special Officer looks after the Women's section under the control of the Principal.
- The Principal, as the leader of the organization, plays a key role in taking decisions and executing them, acting as a liaison between the Management, staff, students, parents and the public.

- Admissions, administration and academic functions include the major responsibilities of the leadership. The administrative and academic committees monitor the quality initiatives.

6.2.4 Does the College have a formally stated quality policy? How is it designed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

Yes. The college has a quality policy in accordance with the vision and mission of the college. The foremost step to ensure quality is the establishment of Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) according to UGC guidelines.

- The IQAC after its formation has been developing a system of conscious, consistent and catalytic action to improve the academic and administrative standards of the institution thereby enhancing the quality of the institution in all possible ways by fulfilling the vision and mission. The IQAC has been continuously trying to keep pace with the fast changing needs.
- IQAC defines the objectives of the institution and chalks-out an action plan to achieve the same.
- Involves experts from different fields on Board of Studies to design curriculum.
- Inclusion of thrust areas in curriculum and periodical revision and restructuring.
- Mandatory assignments, student seminars and student study projects.
- Adoption of ICT in teaching and learning extensively.
- Thrust on extra-curricular activities and soft skills.
- Peer evaluation and self-appraisal of the teachers.
- Academic audit at departmental level.
- Student-centric support services.

- Management Committee, Principal, & IQAC review the quality policy of the college. Finally the policies are communicated to the stakeholders at the appropriate time.
- The effectively designed, driven, deployed and reviewed the quality policy since the inception of the college has ensured the institution to emerge as a centre of academic excellence and research.

6.2.5 How does the College ensure that grievances / complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyze the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder-relationship?

- The Institution has a Grievance Redressal Cell. Grievance Box is kept on the College premises.
- The Grievance Redressal Cell, when receives complaints from students and staff, analyzes the nature of the grievances, conducts an independent enquiry with all concerned, resolves the grievances and submits its report to the Correspondent and the Principal.
- On the request of the students, the management installed a mineral water plant and fans.

6.2.6 Does the College have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If yes, what was the institutional response?

Yes. The IQAC of the college obtains feedback from the students on teaching, learning, evaluation, Infrastructure, student support services and on campus environment, at the beginning and end of the each academic year. A Committee of senior faculty is constituted for the purpose. The committee analyzes the feedback and places before the Principal and Management. There was a demand for safe drinking water and Internet facility from the students. The feedback made by the students was attended to in these assessment years. Safe drinking water is provided in the main building and Internet facility in the library.

6.2.7 In what way the affiliating University helped the College to identify the developmental needs of the College?

- Regular interactions with affiliating university authorities like Registrar, Controller of Exams, Deans of UG and PG, CDC, and their involvement help to identify the developmental needs of the college in respect of curriculum design, starting new UG, PG, and infrastructural development.
- UG and PG Final Degree Certificates are issued by the University.
- The affiliating University nominates senior professors as members to the respective BOS and Academic Council to provide academic

and administrative leadership. Their expertise is reflected in all the resolutions.

- NSS and SPORTS activities are conducted in coordination with the affiliating university.

6.2.8 Does the affiliating university have a functional College Development Council (CDC) or Board of College and University Development (BCUD)? If yes, In what way College is benefitted.

YES. The College Development Council (CDC) is helpful in the following ways:

- The nomination of University Professors to respective BOS and Academic Council of our college for their expertise to be utilized for the designing of curriculum.
- Appointing inspection committees for verifying infrastructural and other facilities viz. Lecture halls, laboratories, library etc. to start the new programmes of study.
- Reviews the status of autonomy.

6.2.9 How does the College get feedback from non-teaching, teaching, parents and alumni on its functioning and how it is utilized.

- The College has adopted the strategy of interaction with the teaching staff and nonteaching staff of the various departments, discussion with class representatives, following mentor system, Alumni are invited to BOS meetings every year.
- The above strategies provide the scope for sustainable interaction on college development and on its functioning with respect to courses, curriculum, teaching, infrastructure, student support services, staff-student relationship, peer relationship and other facilities.
- Moreover department-wise Feedback is analyzed by the Principal and the IQAC. By this mechanism of feedback, the college authorities come to know about the results of different activities performed every year.
- Pros and cons of every college activity are calculated and the best activities are carried forward for the benefit of the students in general. Future action plans are chalked out for the smooth and effective functioning of the college.
- The feedback obtained from above sources is utilized for improving the academic, extracurricular and Infrastructural facilities of the college.

6.2.10 Does the College encourage autonomy to its academic departments and how does it ensure accountability?

- Yes. All our academic departments are empowered with complete autonomy within the frame of UGC guidelines for the autonomous colleges.

- Thus all the academic departments of the Institution are given academic autonomy especially in respect of designing the course curriculum, teaching learning and evaluation processes and the research activities.
- All the departments have complete autonomy in planning and organizing co-curricular, extra-curricular activities and for conducting seminars, conferences, workshops etc.
- Similar is the autonomy given to sports section for planning inter-Collegiate sports activities.
- With regard to academic autonomy the mechanism in force to ensure accountability is that every academic department is timely guided by Board of Studies and Academic Council and further each in charge of the department interacts with the Principal during review meetings.
- The administrative autonomy for sanctioning of leave to the faculty members is with the Principal.
- The departments are given autonomy for the purchase of new books, equipment, any infrastructural requirement for teaching and learning.

6.2.11 Does the College conduct performance auditing of its various departments?

- The staff of all departments submit appraisal reports annually. The appraisal reports from the staff are effective in the conduct of Internal/External Academic Audit.
- The Institutional Annual Report includes the academic activities undertaken by faculties concerned beyond their regular teaching workload. Hence, performance of the faculty can be audited in terms of their research activities, participation/presentation in seminars / conferences and training programmes.
- External academic audit is also conducted by the Commissionerate of Collegiate Education (CCE). External Academic Audit involves Academic advisors trained by the CCE.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 What efforts are made by the College to enhance the professional development of teaching and non teaching staff?

To enhance the professional development of teaching and non-teaching staff, the Institution adopts the following:

Teaching Staff:

- Granting permission to the staff to attend Conferences/ Orientation / Refresher courses.
- Deputing the teachers to attend National and International seminars and Workshops.

- Encouraging teachers to contribute articles to magazines and research journals
- Providing financial assistance to organize state and national level seminars and workshops.
- The faculty members are also encouraged to enhance their professional skills by upgrading their educational qualifications like SET, NET, Ph.D. degrees.
- The details of faculty participation in the above are given in the respective evaluative reports of the departments.
- Every year the college adds books, Journals, Magazines and e-books to the library enabling the faculty to gain professional development.

Non-teaching Staff:

- Conducting periodical workshops to update their technical skills.
- Updating their computer literacy.
- Encouraging non-teaching staff to clear the departmental examinations.
- Granting promotions to higher positions.

6.3.2 What is the outcome of the review of the Performance Appraisal Reports? List the major decisions.

- Every year Academic Performance indicators of the faculty members are submitted to the Commissionerate of Collegiate Education through the Principal by the IQAC. These indicators assess the performance of teachers.
- The appraisal mechanism promotes healthy competition and motivates them for outstanding performance.
- Similarly, staff shouldering the additional responsibility is rewarded with incentives and letters of commendation.
- The average performers are timely issued instructions for improvement. Depending on the individual performance, decision related to continuation of service of unaided faculty is finalized.

The outcome of the review of performance appraisal reports:

- Improved professional competencies of the staff.
- Increased participation of the staff in community outreach programmes.
- Increased pass percentage in the subjects taught.
- Enhanced research competencies in guiding, publishing, attending and organizing seminars, workshops and conferences.

Major decisions based on the outcome of the review:

- To ensure the teachers' total involvement in community services.
- Strict adherence to Institutional quality policy.
- High level adoption of innovative teaching practices.

6.3.3 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

- Pension schemes and family pension schemes for Aided staff
- Dispensary available to the staff.
- Festival advance scheme on easily re-payable monthly installments is available.
- Preference in admission is given to the children of teaching and non-teaching staff.
- The unaided staff members are benefitted with the EPF welfare policy.
- Women faculty members are sanctioned maternity leave.
- A reasonably higher salary package is given to unaided faculty members with SET, NET, Ph.D. Degrees.
- The pay scale of un-aided faculty members is periodically revised.
- All the staff (100%) is benefited by these schemes.

6.3.4 What are the measures taken by the College for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

- Faculty members are significantly encouraged to enhance their qualifications and also to undertake research activities funded by UGC.
- They are also encouraged to enhance their knowledge by attending the refresher courses/ orientation courses/ seminars /Workshops /Conferences in their subjects.
- Retired faculty is reappointed to make use of their rich experiences in teaching, research, Consultancy and Office management.
- Management friendly, Teacher friendly, Student friendly atmosphere on the college campus attracts all the stakeholders.
- Employee friendly service rules are in place in the Institution.
- Eminent faculty is given due recognition and representation in various Committees constituted to carry out the important work of the college within stipulated time.

6.3.5 Has the College conducted a gender audit during the last four years? If yes, mention a few salient findings.

- To have a cohesive group of employees and to inculcate the spirit of one family, the Institution never selects any employee at any level on gender basis.
- As and when required, statistical information about gender is submitted to State Govt./UGC. Presently, of the total faculty strength there are approximately 50% female faculty members. Similar ratio is there with respect to non-teaching staff.

- Women's Parallel Sections are located on a separate campus.
- 40:60 male-female ratio is there in PG enrollment.

6.3.6 Does the College conduct any gender sensitization programs for its staff?

- The Institution is fortunate enough to have a "family feeling" among all the employees.
- The college through the NSS has organized Gender Sensitization programmes for both students and staff.
- A Seminar was arranged exclusively for women students on "Adolescence-a Mission" in women's parallel section. Dr. Jamuna Rani, Gynaecologist, Yashoda Hospitals, Hyderabad was the speaker.
- An awareness programme on "Sanitary Wash" was organized. Dr. Kala Soundarya, MD, DGO, GNR Hospital, Kurnool, sensitized the women students on this topic.
- NSS Unit of women students participated in the Rallies like World Aids day, Anti-Child abuse, Anti-dowry awareness, etc.
- Under the aegis of the Women Empowerment Cell legal awareness programmes are conducted.

6.3.7 What is the impact of the University's UGC-Academic Staff College Programmes in enhancing competencies of the College faculty?

- Competencies of the college staff in the areas such as Skill development, Enhanced knowledge base, improved teaching methods are highly enhanced by participation in the Academic Staff College programmes such as Orientation Programmes, Refresher Courses, Short Term Courses, Summer/Winter School Courses.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of financial resources?

- The prime focus of the finance committee constituted as per UGC Regulations is to supervise the financial resources.
- UGC provides substantial financial assistance for the growth and development of the Institution.
- The UGC grants received are distributed to various departments, and Library for infrastructural requirements.
- The preparation of the Institutional annual budget involves the interaction of finance committee and the respective departments for budgetary allocation.
- Departmental budgets are discussed and approved by the Board of Management according to the Departmental needs assessment and prioritization before preparing annual action plans and budgets.

- The Finance Committee has the responsibility to monitor the departmental financial requirements within the framework of the budget sanctioned.
- Purchases are made by Purchase Committee.

6.4.2 Does the College have a mechanism for internal and external audit? Give details.

- Yes. The College Superintendent prepares the audited statements for every financial year.
- The Institution has internal audit mechanism where all the income and expenditure is audited annually.
- The accounts of the college are verified with documentary evidence and consequent certification of authenticity of such accounts constitute internal audit.
- The external audit is done by, A.P.

- For undertaking the research projects, the College Management encourages the departments to approach funding agencies like UGC, ICSSR, CSIR, and etc.
- The Management, represented by the elite from all walks of life, maintaining cordial relations with all political and non-political diversified groups of the town, is able to mobilize resources from local MP(MPLADS) for laying internal roads in the college during 2014, with an estimated amount of 16.8 Lakhs

6.4.5 Is there any provision for the College to maintain the corpus fund? If yes, give details.

- Yes, the College has generated the corpus fund 18.13 Lakhs as on 31-03-2015.

6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System

External Academic Audit:

Internal Academic Audit:


- The staff council would examine the teaching diaries, syllabus covered, and attendance of staff and students, preparation of question papers, etc.
- Examination committee monitors the examinations and results from setting of the question papers till evaluation and publication of results.
- Every year, on the College day the Principal presents the annual report which mainly consists of all the academic activities of various departments.

6.5.2 Based on the recommendations of academic audit what specific measures have been taken by the College to improve teaching, learning and evaluation?

- The CCE has introduced grading system in academic audit from 2014. The College was graded at 'A' level in 2014-15.
- Based on the recommendations of the academic audit, the Principal suggests the specific measures to be taken by the Staff for quality enhancement in teaching and learning.

6.5.3 Is there a central body within the College to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

- Yes. The Principal, IQAC and Heads of the Departments continuously monitor and evaluate teaching - learning process and there by monitor academic development.
- The IQAC, the College Academic advisory committee and Board of Studies review teaching learning process.
- The BOS of each department revises the syllabi according to the suggestions and latest trends of the academic scenario.
- The recommendations of the advisory committee will be conveyed to the Academic Council and then to the Governing Body for ratification and implementation.

- The IQAC under the leadership of Principal reviews the teaching-learning process and related matters. During staff council meetings, the IQAC conducts separate sessions for the review of teaching-learning and evaluation process.
- In consideration with IQAC recommendations, the important outcomes are

 - b. Enhancement in infrastructural facilities for classrooms, laboratories and library
 - c. Introduction of Choice Based Credit System (2015-16 onwards)

6.5.4 How has IQAC contributed to institutionalizing quality assurance strategies and processes?

The IQAC of the College was established in 2005 and till date IQAC has contributed in the following ways ensuring the Institutional quality. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell plays a significant role with a vision - “empowerment through pursuit of excellence.”

The quality assurance of the Institution is achieved by IQAC through:

- Effectively disseminating information on the various quality parameters of Higher Education.
- Promoting research and creating tempo of enthusiasm for research activities in every department.

- Promoting the use of technology for effective teaching learning process,
- Organizing various National, International, State Level Seminars, Conferences, Workshops etc.

6.5.5 Does the IQAC have external members on its committees? If so, mention any significant contribution made by such members.

Yes. Significant contributions by the external members:

- One of the External members, Mr. M. Linga Reddy. Deputy Commissioner of Commercial Taxes, who is also alumnus of the institution, has spearheaded a campaign for the protection of River Hundri through SAVE HUNDRI as a part of Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR). The sustained effort of the Institution, staff and students has led to the proclamation of SAVE HUNDRI DAY on the 5th of DECEMBER every year by the Govt. of A.P. through the gazette notification C.R.No. 418/2013 dated 28-02-2013.
- Another external member, Sri C. Buchanna C.A., alumnus of the institution has provided an opportunity for the students of Commerce to undergo internship at his office. This has provided ample scope for the student to have hands-on experience about the matter relating to the filing of IT returns. This in-turn has helped the students to file the preliminary returns of IT of their teachers and earn some Income through the “EARN WHILE YOU LEARN” scheme.

6.5.6 Has the IQAC conducted any study on the incremental academic growth of students from disadvantaged sections of society?

Yes.

- Socially backward, economically weaker and differently abled students are given preference in the college admissions.
- Efforts are taken to monitor the academic growth of such students.
- They are given incentives, fee concessions, Endowment Scholarships etc.

6.5.7 What policies are in place for the periodic review of administrative and academic departments, subject areas, research centres, etc.?

- The college has distinct policies for the periodic review of administrative and academic areas.
- IQAC provides a sound basis for decision-making at administrative and academic levels to improve institutional functioning.
- The Governing Body of the college meets twice in a year to approve the resolutions of the Academic Council and Finance Committee.
- The Principal, in consultation with the members of Management Committee, formulates policy decision on academic and other administrative matters.

- The Principal convenes meetings with all the Heads of the Departments periodically to discuss/review various academic and administrative activities of the college.
- The Heads of Departments conduct staff meetings of their respective department, as and when required, in order to plan and perform all academic activities in a smooth manner.
- The entire academic work including the time-table, work allotment to individual staff member, teaching plan, the purchase of books, organizing seminars / workshops, question papers setting work, assignment for students, remedial classes, coaching classes and all other academic matters are discussed/reviewed in the meetings convened by the Heads of the Departments.
- The various committees constituted, play a vital role in identifying the requirements and periodically reviewing the inputs for proper implementations.
- Academic Audits are conducted once a year to review all academic matters.
- The Principal, the Academic Advisory Committee and the respective Departmental Heads review the activities of academic departments.

Yes, the college conducts Green Audit on its campus. The Botanical Garden Committee, Campus Development and Beautification Committee govern the internal green audit of campus every year. Following are the best practices undertaken to enhance the ecological balance in the last five years.

Following are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly.

- Plantation of saplings
- Water Harvesting
- Plastic free Campus
- Swachh Bharat
- e-waste Management
- Carbon Neutrality
- Energy Conservation

Plantation: NCC cadets, NSS volunteers and Green Corps, frequently organize plantation programmes on the Campus. Plants and Gardens are systematically maintained by the gardeners to ensure an eco-friendly environment. Multiplication of saplings by adopting the methods of layering, grafting and budding has been the best practice in the Botanical garden.

Water Harvesting: With the Motto ‘Save Water and Conserve Water’, the students are strictly instructed to close the water taps when they are not in use. Rain water harvesting pits are setup in the college. There is a 68 years old water harvesting practice existing in the college Main Building.

Plastic Free Campus: NCC Cadets, NSS Volunteers and the members of the other clubs periodically organize plastic free campus to ensure an eco-friendly atmosphere.

Swachh Bharath: Staff and students organize ‘Swachh Osmania’ in every quarter of the year.

Carbon neutrality: The College takes leading steps for neutrality of carbon by plantation.

E-waste management: The e-waste produced from the computers and electronic gadgets is collected periodically and sold to the local scrap agent. Some of the e-waste material is reused by making certain improvement and repair by the departments concerned.

Energy Conservation: The institution follows the slogan of “energy saved is energy generated”. Switching off fans, lights, air-conditioners, and unplugging computers, printers, electrical and electronic equipment when they are not in use, are some of the initiatives in this regard.

Use of Renewable Energy: The College organizes lectures with experts on energy conservation and its related aspects in order to provide awareness to the students in saving energy.

7.2 Innovations.

7.2.1 Provide details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the College.

Curriculum is periodically revised based on the latest trends and developments of the economy. Innovations made in academic and

related activities speak of the progress of the college in leaps and bounds. The details of the innovations are given below:

- Reciting Prayer from the Bhagawad Gita, Prayer from the Bible, and Prayer from the Quran at the beginning of every function organized by the college to instill the spirit of tolerance, secularism and National Integrity.
- Gene Insertion in Tomato at National Institute of Plant Genome Research, New Delhi, by Dr. M. Silar Mohammed, Reader in Botany.
- Digital library maintained by the Department of Botany.
- Discovery of new variety of plant *Cyathula Prostrata* variety, *Ahobilamensis*
- Two P.G. Courses were started viz. M.A. Telugu and M.Sc. Mathematics
- Four Certificate courses started viz. Women Empowerment, Garment Making, Yoga, Identification of Medicinal Plants of Nallamalais.

7.3 Best Practices

7.3.1 Give details of any two best practices which have contributed to better academic and administrative functioning of the college.

BEST PRACTICE - 1

Title of the Practice:

Save Hundri River Campaign (SHRC): Students Group Starts Initiative to Save Hundri

Objectives:

SHRC works to achieve the objectives of pollution and encroachment free river.

- Our mission is to protect the Hundri River through advocacy, education and research.
- Move to sensitize people to the ecological importance of the river
- Campaign to ensure adequate discharge of water to the Hundri
- Authorities urged to fill all tanks and streams with the present spell of rain
- Sand quarrying, dumping of garbage, release of sewage, cause immense damage to the river
- To clean up the river from Anand theatre to Johrapuram

Context:

SHRC uses the term 'ecological flow' that means maintaining adequate water flow in the river just for its ecological health. The SHRC should have used the term 'environmental flow', which also accounts for human needs such as groundwater recharge potential of the river.

In a bid to contribute to saving the Hundri river in Kurnool, a group of NCC Cadets and NSS Volunteers studying in Osmania College has launched the "Save Hundri River Campaign", aimed at spreading awareness about the river and the urgency of saving it.

The Save Hundri River Campaign is an effort to sensitize people to the current situation. Online petitions were filed and a documentary is in progress to show the significance of the campaign.

Practice:

The Hundri, which finds a place in ancient scriptures as Hydravathi, has great significance in development of human habitations alongside river banks. A few decades ago, Kurnool city depended on the river for the drinking water needs, when the river flowed through summer months without a break. Now it is on the verge of extinction following the construction of Gajuladinne project. One would appreciate the efforts of the Government which constructed a project in the dry Kodumur and Pathikonda zone. But the Gajuladinne project was causing serious social and ecological problems.

Before the project came up, the Hundri was a perennial river, which flowed at its peak during summer, meeting the water needs of 50 villages. The river bed generated income for thousands of families who grew water-melon and musk-melon during the summer. After the project, every drop of water was being stored in the reservoir paralysing the economy and posing a threat to the livelihood of the people in the river bank villages.

Serious disputes were arising over water sharing as social outlook lacked in distribution. The arguments against supply of drinking water from Gajuladinne often pained them as Kurnool city which existed on the banks of the Hundri had a right to draw water from the river for its drinking needs.

“Save Hundri River Campaign” Plans to take up a movement to keep the river flowing through out the year by ensuring discharge of water from Gajuladinne in small quantities.

Evidence of Success:

A representation was made by our Alumni M. Linga Reddy and our students to the District Collector seeking notification of the day and steps to save the Hundri river. The district administration considered the proposal and took steps for the notification of Hundri Day on every December 5, which is also the World Volunteers Day.

The government notified December 5 as “Hundri River Day” through an extraordinary gazette to preserve the ecologically important water body flowing through the heart of the Kurnool city.

The administration and the voluntary group discussed the steps to celebrate the event every year to sensitize the public to the ecological importance of the river and voluntary efforts to prevent the flow of pollutants into the river.

‘Save Hundri River’ is an environmental and ecological campaign being represented by 1000 student volunteers and the staff and individuals. Founded in 2012 under the guidance and supervision of Mr. Syed Samiuddin Muzammil, Co-ordinator, IQAC, Dr. S. Mansoor Rahman, Co-ordinator-UGC, Dr. M. Anwar Hussain NCC Officer and the student volunteers are mainly focusing on identifying and reporting pollution problems, motivating the people who care for the river to speak out. Writing to or calling upon elected officials, attending public hearings, signing petitions etc. are taken to ensure the protection of the Hundri River.

The movement was formally launched by the District Collector C. Sudarshan Reddy on 5th December 2013. The volunteers removed weeds and conducted candle light ceremony in the evening on the banks of the Hundri. The same activities were performed by the students in 2014.

On 5th December 2015 a **Rally** at 8 AM and **Candle Light Rally** at 7 PM followed by a **Public Meeting were organized** involving people representatives, Sri S V Mohan Reddy MLA, Smt. Gouru Charita Reddy MLA, and prominent personalities and voluntary organizations.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

The river went dry gradually due to over exploitation of water resources in the upper reaches for agriculture, construction of Gajuladinne project, 50 km upstream of the city and failing monsoons.

The river bed used to produce the sweetest musk melon in summer, supporting hundreds of fishermen families which took up cultivation. However, the crop was abandoned after the sand table vanished.

Indiscriminate quarrying of sand from the river bed, dumping of garbage, release of sewage, and encroachment for cultivation of crops had caused irreparable damage to the river.

The campaign decides to clean up the river from Anand theatre to Johrapuram by removing the silt, weed and other hurdles for free flow of river.

The campaign would prevail upon municipal and revenue authorities to treat the sewage before letting into the river and stop dumping garbage.

BEST PRACTICE - 2

Title of the Practice :

“Women Empowerment”

Objectives of the Practice:

A Parallel Women’s Section of the college caters to the need of Women’s education in and around Kurnool. Women constitute 58% of the total students’ strength of the college. A majority of them come from the downtrodden backward and Minority Sections of the Society. They are relegated to an inferior status, economically, socially and politically in spite of all the rights and provision guaranteed by the Constitution. So the institution has taken onerous task of women’s education in general and women empowerment in particular. A very vibrant Women Empowerment Cell has been constituted with the following objectives:

- To create awareness among the students.

- Mentoring women students on women specific issues with one woman teacher as mentor for every 40 women students.
- Creating an environment through awareness programmes to enable the students to realize their full potential for learning and solving their problems independently.
- Visiting the families by the coordinator and members of the unit to offer personal counseling to the exploited and persuade the parents for their children's participation in all the programmes meant for their better future.
- Conducting seminars and special sessions on eve-teasing and dowry system to expose the ill-effect of the evils.
- Extending financial assistance to the deserving poor women and the disadvantaged sections to help acquire their degrees.
- Tackling the social, developmental, health consequences and prevention of HIV/AIDS from gender perspective.

The intended outcome is that the women students should be aware of all forms of discrimination as well as rights and legal provisions for their protection and thus empowers them to courageously face the problems for a life of amiability, order and dignity. The underlying concept is that **Woman's empowerment empowers the whole world.**

Context:

The coordinator and the members of the unit had to visit certain families and persuade the parents that all the programmes were meant for the betterment and empowerment of their dear daughters. AS the gender sensitization programmes designed revealed several disparities and inequalities, that we might not have noticed earlier, people especially the other gender, argued discussing gender and gender roles would break up families and destroy society. Even some teachers supporting the argument often opined that the change was difficult to accept as the ideas emanated from the seminars/workshops/debates on gender inequalities appeared new and startling.

Practice:

Discrimination against women even in the 21st century is a devastating reality. That is why 'gender inequality' has been a matter of serious concern across the globe and within the countries. India still has a long way to go before achieving gender equity and empowerment of women. Kurnool is the most backward district in Andhra Pradesh owing to frequent droughts and famines. Especially, the rural areas are

ravaged by the miserable conditions of abject poverty, illiteracy, ill-health and superstition. The college girls account for 55% of the total strength and most of them come from poor background. The majority of these girls belong to the weaker sections, backward classes and minorities without proper access to education, health and other productive resources. Therefore, they remain largely as the marginalized poor and socially excluded. Joining a degree college in the town and acquiring higher education involve money and higher things. So the poverty-stricken and tradition-bound parents reluctantly admit their daughters to colleges. Being the most vibrant and dynamic segment, the youth including girls, is our most valuable human resource. We cannot afford to neglect our female force to be the victims of discrimination, exploitation and segregation. So, the college resolved to empower female students to face the vicissitudes of life boldly and successfully for a life of peace, harmony and dignity.

To achieve the aim, the college established a **Women Empowerment Cell (WEC)** with a senior woman teacher as its Coordinator and three other senior women teachers as the members. All female students are eligible to take membership of the Cell irrespective of their status. There are two hundred girl student members in the unit.

The Coordinator and the members of the unit meet twice a month and decide the conduct of awareness sessions during leisure hours sensitizing the girls to know why and how they are given subservient role in spite of their equal or even more abilities than their counterparts. They also draw an annual action plan for organizing various awareness programmes / seminars / workshops and interactive sessions. The Principal along with the Coordinator monitors the implementation of the plan. The Coordinator and the members are responsible for the implementation of the programmes in consultation with several NGOs like Mahila Samaj, Lions Club and Government officials from the Department of Social Welfare, Adult Education, Women and Child Welfare, Judiciary and Medical Departments.

The College has organized several productive programmes so far extensively utilizing the services of the widespread network of NGOs which have a strong grass-root level presence with deep insight into women's concerns contributing to the inspiring initiatives for the empowerment of women. The Cell also arranged an exclusive medical camp for girls for the treatment of

women-related health problems by Dr. Aruna Jyothi MBBS, Medical Officer on 02-02-2014.

Evidence of Success:

Women Empowerment Cell of the college has been quite successful in guiding, mentoring and leading its members. In the academic year 2014 – 2015 eight students namely,

emerged successful in spite of severe problems at home. Another interesting thing about these students is they are all married and they are able to strike a balance between their personal life and student life as they are doing quite well in their studies after being supported by Women Empowerment Cell.

The Women Empowerment Cell has taken a responsible and sympathetic view of the girls who were misled and involved in love affairs throwing the families of the both sides into turmoil.

- Sailaja, a student of B.Sc., (M.B.), in spite of her parents' ill health, continued her education through counselling by women empowerment cell.
- Shaik Naziya of B.B.M. in spite of facing harassment by her in-laws, continued her education after getting support from Women Empowerment Cell.
- Gayathri of B.Sc., (CBZ) faced harassment to discontinue her studies, but empowerment cell counselled her and her family members. Now she is able to continue her studies.

Our proud alumnae Syeda Tanweer has been elevated to the position of **lieutenant**. Kum. Praveena Reddy, an NCC Cadet studying I B.Sc (MB), attended **National Camp**. One of our women students, S. Jafreen while pursuing her studies, is able to continue her career as **International Tennis Player** successfully and S. Pushpalatha of III B. Com. Has won **I Prize at State Level** Essay Writing Competition on Consumer Awareness.

The review results point out that there should be corresponding change in the social mindset for a positive impact of any programme/effort. If the efforts continue with commitment and sincerity in spite of impediments, success will certainly follow.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

- i. Some of the modest students were reluctant to cross their academic borders affecting the successful conduct of awareness programmes.
- ii. The first awareness camp for female students on HIV/AIDS received a discouraging response as women's talking about sex and AIDS is still a taboo.
- iii. Ensuring the all-round support and participation of women teachers in programmes is also a tough task.
- iv. Women students' impulsiveness in the matter of love in the adolescent age is a sensitive issue to be dealt with by women teachers.
- v. Organizing various programmes during working hours, sometimes, has led to sacrificing the class work.
- vi. Implementation of the annual plan and its monitoring has become a tough task in view of tight academic schedule in the autonomous ambience.

Notes:

- i. NGOs and other women welfare organizations should be invited to be the members of the Women Empowerment Cell for effective sensitization of the students on gender issues and for regular organization of various awareness programmes, as they have a strong grassroots level presence with deep insight into women's concerns.
- ii. A special concern for the poor girls with rural background will make the efforts more meaningful.
- iii. The best practice should be given the status of NCC and NSS in implementation and monitoring the activities.
- iv. The services of former students who have good exposure and experience of gender issues should also be utilized for achieving the objectives and aims of the Empowerment Cell.
- v. Parents Meets should also be conducted at regular intervals for a positive change of their mindset to enable their daughters to participate in the programmes meant for their all round development.

Weaknesses :

- 80% of the students are from rural background and they come from ill-equipped schools.
- As far as our learners are concerned, in addition to subject, language, basic grammar, motivation has to be done at a higher level;
- The Dept. has to face a number of hurdles in overcoming the Mother Tongue Influence of students; and
- Grant-in-posts are not filled.

Opportunities:

- Students who are good at English have the bright chances of becoming ELT experts and earn jobs in the software field’;
- Students who possess good communication skills are preferred in the job market. Thereafter they can earn promotions;
- The facility for the students joining UG course to pursue their studies upto PG give them the opportunity of vertical mobility;
- Students have the opportunity to join civil services; and
- The college library has a good collection of subject books, dictionaries, reference books, literary works and volumes and encyclopedia, journals and back volumes which gives a great opportunity for literature students for a rich exposure.

Challenges:

- Bringing up the rural first learners having uneducated parents to the desired levels of higher education is a real challenge to be faced by the college;
- The medium of instruction of a majority of students is vernacular at school level and the sudden switch over to English as medium of instruction at college level is surely a challenge to the staff of our department;
- It is a challenge to concentrate on subject matter, spelling and vocabulary, basic grammar and the communicative skills of our rural first learners; and
- There is deficiency of Aided staff in the department.
